Film: *Aftermath*, Wladyslaw Pasikowski, writer and director (2013, Polish with English subtitles, 104 minutes). A drama loosely based on a historical event.

Guest speaker: Dr. Dorota Glowacka, University of King's College

Aftermath, tells the story of two sons of a poor farmer, Franek and Jozek. Franek immigrates to the United States in the 1980's. He only returns after a surprise visit from Jozek's wife pleading with him to return back to his homeland. Once there Franek discovers that his brother has been ostracized and threatened by the community. The two brothers struggle with rebuilding their relationship as they uncover a dark secret of their hometown: the collective murder of the Jewish residents by their neighbours during World War II.

My Personal Testimony: Renata Skotnicka-Zajdman, Holocaust survivor

Renata Skotnicka-Zajdman was fourteen years old when German forces met armed resistance from hundreds of Jewish fighters during the liquidation of the Warsaw ghetto. Crawling through the fetid sewers, she had escaped the day before the uprising began. She survived for a time on the streets, before being rescued by Zegota, the Polish underground organization; she was cared for by the head of its children's section, the now-legendary Irena Sendler (a Polish social worker who defied the Nazis and saved over 2,500 Jewish children from the Warsaw ghetto). Now living in Montreal, Mrs. Skotnicka-Zajdman is co-author of the book *Shards of Memory: Narratives of the Holocaust*, and served as consultant for the TV film The *Courageous Heart of Irena Sendler*.

Norman Conrad is an American educator and director of the Life in a Jar Irena Sendler Foundation. He is the recipient of the National Civil Rights Award and a member of the National Teachers Hall of Fame for creating projects that teach respect and understanding through historical examples. In 1999, Mr. Conrad's students in Kansas discovered Irena Sendler's story, which soon gained international recognition.

Tuesday, November 5th: Guest speaker and Holocaust survivor Philip Riteman was born in Poland. He was originally detained in Auschwitz, and then went on to several other concentration camps including Dachau. After Mr. Riteman was liberated by the Americans, he immigrated to Newfoundland. He currently lives in Halifax, Nova Scotia, and frequently speaks about his personal experience during the Holocaust. His biography, *Millions of Souls*, was recently published by Flanker Press.

Names Instead of Numbers showcases a selection of twenty-two biographies from the Dachau Remembrance Book Project (a collection of life stories of former Dachau camp prisoners). The exhibition has been shown in five languages and displayed in Germany, France, the Netherlands, Austria, Great Britain, Poland, and USA, and Canada. The exhibit brings to light a more personal side of the Holocaust's horrors and honours the memories of the people, families and communities lost.

Kinderblock 66 tells the story of four men who return to the notorious Buchenwald concentration camp to commemorate the 65th anniversary of their liberation. European Jewish children from all over the continent were transferred into the barrack in early 1945. The block 66 was led by Antonin Kalina, a Czech Communist and his deputy, Gustav Schiller, a Polish Jew. The youths in the block did not work and were protected against being sent out of the camp. The block leaders watched over the children and cared for them to the extent possible, seeing in these youths hope for the future. They strove until the last days of the war and beyond to keep them from danger and alive. On April 11, 1945, Buchenwald was liberated. Nearly 1000 boys survived.
