

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Message From The President



This message marks a very significant time for me as President of A.J.C.. As I am in the final stage of my term as President, I have been reflecting upon the accomplishments and the disappointments, as well as the efforts required to ensure that the organization is on a solid footing for the future.

The pride which I have and share with the Executive in some of our outstanding achievements is highlighted first in the procurement of the right Executive Director for A.J.C., Emmanuel Zabar. It took a year of perseverance to locate such a person, but as evidenced in his accomplishments, it was well worth the struggle and has opened new horizons for Atlantic Canada. The Atlantic Haggadah, UIA, and Operation Exodus are a few of the outstanding successes this year. Besides leaving the organization financially sound, we are in the process of reorganizing the Shalom Magazine, as is evident in this shorter format which I will address later. Atlantic Jewish Council is in the final stages of trying to obtain a charitable tax number. The Camp Kadimah Committee has done a great job over the last two years and I believe that AJC has provided a stable environment and direction within which the Camp can flourish.

Another positive situation for A.J.C. is the increase in our administrative staff. The expansion in our staff numbers has been effective in working to satisfy community needs. Our staff includes Christina MacNeil as Office Administrator, Tina Wright as Executive Assistant and receptionist, Edie Young as UIA Administrator, our most recent newcomer, Marta Chernin as Program Animator, and of course Emmanuel Zabar as Executive Director. To further add to the efficiency of our staff, we are in the final process of fully computerizing our office, which is always a trying experience but very necessary for future advancement.

One of the major disappointments in my term as President, has been the failure to attract more youth and more women into the Executive decision-making process. I am hoping in the next month, that the Nomination Committee will be successful in working to achieve this goal. It would be extremely helpful if people would volunteer instead of waiting to be sought out. Each volunteer might be as pleasantly surprised as I was to find that by giving of yourself, it can be a very rewarding and enriching experience, as in essence you are trying to better the community in which you live. Another setback was our inability to appeal to many of the subscribers of the Shalom Magazine and Atlantic Jewish Directory, where approximately only 25% of the people paid their voluntary subscription fees. Since my philosophy is to pay as you go rather than running a deficit, I must recommend discontinuing the use of the expensive format of our previous magazines until there is either more favourable response by paid subscriptions or a more successful means of selling advertisements. I appeal to you to pay your subscriptions now. As to the format and advertisement, I am making an exerted effort with a committee presently to establish the most cost efficient approach.

Before I conclude this message, I take pleasure in publicly thanking our diligent staff, our active Executive, and the many hundreds of volunteers who have contributed so much to the success of A.J.C. during the past two years of my term. I found my term as President to be very challenging, self fulfilling, and intellectually stimulating. Although I have directed much time and energy to my task, I have gained much more than that from it. It has indeed been as honour for me to have served as your President of Atlantic Jewish Council.

To leave you with a single but meaningful thought, I turn to the simple but thought provoking word - TOLERANCE. If we are to expect tolerance in the world, than we must start first with tolerance amongst ourselves and helping each other.

Thank you for your support. My best wishes to you for a Healthy and Happy New Year.

The Atlantic Haggadah

The Jewish communities of Atlantic Canada celebrated their Past, Present and Future in a Gala evening on May 27, 1990 at the Halifax Hilton. A gathering of over 550 people created the first ever such Jewish get together in Atlantic Canada - consisting of four generations of families from all over the region.

An original musical-show, specially written for the event was performed by over 100 people, of all ages, to the sheer delight of the audience. The dramatic events of Operation Exodus were the peak of the Future part of the show.

This event was the highlight of six months work in the communities creating what is hoped to be "a new annual tradition in the Jewish life of Atlantic Canada".

The idea of the Atlantic Haggadah was nurtured and came to life by Emmanuel Zabar, who started his job as the Executive Director of the Atlantic Jewish Council last September. Judging from the enthusiastic response of the Jewish community - it seems certain that a new lively prospect is on the threshold of the cultural life of our communities in Atlantic Canada.

Rabbi Wolff, Ladies & Gentlemen, My task today, as President of Tiferes Israel, is both a pleasant one and a not so pleasant one. And now, as you and your family move to Montreal, we wish you well.

Today is a very symbolic day as well. We had the naming of a baby in Synagogue this morning. As our Rabbi is leaving, a new member comes along. And so our congregation continues.

Then the President Ellie made a few remarks to the crowd about the status of our community.

This is the kind of thing that keeps a community together with a little bit of "Rosh Hakodesh", all together, it gives us a sense of belonging, a commitment to our Shabbos Services, a feeling that our congregation is indeed organized. Sukkot Traditions By Phyllis Glazer, WZPS

The holiday spirit prevails this month with Sukkot, Hoshanah Rabbah, Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah.

It's autumn now in Israel; the worst of the summer heat has passed, and the evenings are cool and pleasant. Sukkot, the autumn "Feast of the Ingathering", honours the first fruits of the harvest, and recalls the sukkot, the little booths that served our ancestors throughout their desert wanderings.

On porches and in yards around the country, sukkot dot the landscape, adding eight days of colour to city life. Fortuitously, the holiday also coincides with the seasonal trimming of the trees by the various municipalities; consequently, palm and other branches are left in piles on the streets, available for the taking. These will form the roof and often part of the decor of the booth.

The Jews of Tunis make their sukka primarily from palm and myrtle leaves, with a low arch designed to make those who enter bow in obeisance and respect. Moroccan Jews add a chair or stool by one wall, in honor of Elijah the Prophet.

Ashkenazi Jews tend to make the walls of their sukkot from fabric, with a palm-leaved roof in order to see the starlit sky. Sukkot-builders of every ethnic background make sure to add an especially colourful touch with strings of seasonal fruits, including pomegranates, fresh dates, figs and apples. "And you shall take on the first day the fruit of goodly trees, branches of palm trees, and boughs of leafy trees, and

willows of the brook, and you shall rejoice before the Lord seven days" (Leviticus 23:40). These are interpreted to refer to the lulav (palm frond) and etrog (citron) which are taken by the devout to the synagogue and kept in the sukka throughout the holiday.

Traditional foods for the holiday vary according to ethnic derivation. Tunisian Jews prepare "machmar" - stuffed eggplant in tomato and onion sauce, and a form of couscous. Ashkenazi Jews tend to mark the harvest and thanksgiving days with an abundance of fruit and vegetable dishes.

The seventh day of Sukkot, Hoshanah Rabbah, is celebrated with a special service in which a procession marches seven times around the synagogue. Willow branches are beaten, the falling leaves symbolizing the arrival of rains and the hope of renewed life. A traditional dish for this holiday is "kreplach", pockets of dough stuffed with meat.

On the eighth day of Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, prayers of rain and remembrance of the dead are included in the service.

Hebrew Congregation of Newfoundland By Dr. Michael Paul

Late on March 11, the Israeli Consul-General (from Montreal), Mr. Chalom Schirman arrived. His official itinerary began early on Monday, March 12. He and Dr. M. Paul were taken by a Government car to Bishop's High School. They were met by the teacher, Claire Frankel-Salama who introduced them to her French immersion class. For 1-1/4 hours Mr. Schirman talked about Israel, Mid-East politics, the problems of the Intifada and other topics. Several of the students asked very interesting and pertinent questions. At 10:30 Mr. Schirman and Dr. Paul were met at Government House by Mr. Sidney Epstein, President of the congregation, for the official visit to His Honour the Lt-Governor, Mr. J. McGrath. This meeting lasted about 30 minutes. Many questions were asked by His Honour during this time concerning the peace process and the differences in philosophy of the many Israeli political parties.

Mr. Schirman presented His Honour with an Israeli medallion, as a gift from the State of Israel.

The next call was at the House of Assembly where the group met with the Premier, Mr. Clyde Wells. A discussion ensued concerning the Newfoundland Jewish community.

"Cultures P.E.I." Statement By Joe Naylor

The following statement on the "History and Activities of the P.E.I. Jewish Community" was issued by the Correspondence Committee at the request of the P.E.I. Multicultural Council for inclusion in the special 15th Anniversary edition of its newsletter Cultures P.E.I.:

The P.E.I. Jewish community has always been small in number. At present, about thirty families participate in its activities.

Jewish families on P.E.I. had met informally for social meetings and celebrations of religious holidays since at least the 1960's. A Jewish culture and Hebrew Language Sunday School organized and run by them, with some funding from the Department of Multiculturalism, was begun in the late 1970's for the children of the families. At the request of the school teachers, a meeting of the Jewish commu-

nity was held on October 10, 1982 which organized ad hoc committees for "Holiday Planning" and "Correspondence". A quarterly newsletter was begun by the correspondence Committee at that time.

On October 14, 1984, the Jewish community met and constituted itself as the P.E.I. Jewish Community. Apart from passing minimal rules for holding meetings, the community preserved its generally ad hoc structure instead of instituting a more formal organization. The Hebrew School, Holiday Committee, and Correspondence Committee were re-established, and the community joined the P.E.I. Multicultural Council.

The community's celebrations of the religious festivals Chanukah, Pesach (Passover), and Sukkot are particularly well-attended. In addition to the festivals and the Hebrew School, the activities of the community have included adult Jewish Studies groups, adult Hebrew language classes, and a Holocaust commemoration co-sponsored with Christian organizations.

Mr. Schirman was most interested in Mr. Well's comments concerning current Canadian affairs. At the end of the meeting Mr. Schirman presented Mr. Wells with a replica of part of the Dead Sea Scrolls. Mr. Wells, in return, presented Mr. Schirman with a book on Newfoundland and Labrador.

At 12:30 Mr. Schirman, Mr. Epstein and Dr. Paul were entertained at a luncheon given by the Speaker of the House of Assembly, Mr. T. Lush. During the meal, the former Premier, Mr. Brian Peckford dropped by and was introduced to Mr. Schirman. At 2:00 p.m. the party entered the Chamber of the House of Assembly and were individually introduced to the Members by the Speaker. They were warmly welcomed by all. The party stayed for part of the question period, but had to leave because of an appointment with His Worship the Mayor, Mr. John Murphy. At city Hall, Mr. Murphy asked Mr. Schirman many questions concerning life in Israel, which the Consul-General was only too happy to explain. That evening after enjoying a light dinner of Newfoundland seafood, Mr. Schirman gave a lecture entitled "Power and Powerlessness in Jewish History" in the auditorium of the S.J. Carew Engineering Building at Memorial University. This was given under the auspices of the Department of Political Science and was arranged by Dr. S. Wolinetz. Mr. Schirman returned to Montreal on Tuesday, March 13.

Recently, Gander has been the site of an increased number of defections from Soviet-bloc countries, especially from Bulgaria. The community has been made aware of at least two Jewish men amongst the group. One of them, a 28 year old has attended the Synagogue. Through the help of the parents of Dr. Anat Stemmer, and Mr. and Mrs. R. Rachamimoff, the community has been able to communicate with them. As a matter of fact, the Canadian government has recently flown Mrs. Rachamimoff back from Toronto in order for her to help with interpretation.

Giving By Rabbi Michael Wolff, Moncton



The Talmud has a discussion on ways to give charity and says that the best method is to set up a box in a public place into which people can put money and from which money can be withdrawn privately, without others knowing. In this manner, neither the giver knows the receiver, nor does the receiver know the giver. This is the highest form of charity, short of finding someone a job, because the community anonymously provides for the needy without the needy ever becoming known. Then the Talmud notes that in practice the system does not work because usually more people take funds than give them and the charity box is always short of funds. It is an ideal method in theory, but not in practice.

Appointment Senator Jack Marshall

Senator Jack Marshall has been named National Commander of the Jewish War Veterans of Canada. A native of Glace Bay, Nova Scotia, Marshall served with the Canadian Army in World War II and retired with the rank of Colonel in 1968. First elected to the House of Commons in 1968, he was appointed to the Senate in 1978 and is Chairman of the Senate subcommittee on Veterans Affairs. A former branch president, Marshall has long championed veterans causes. The Jewish War Veterans represents more than 17,000 Jewish veterans of World War II. Marshall replaces outgoing national Commander David Croll, who held the position for ten years.

Operation Aliyah and State of Israel Bonds By Lionel Segal

The Government of Israel has requested Israel Bonds to sell at least \$1,000,000,000 in Bonds worldwide in 1990 in order to help the State absorb the influx of Soviet Jewry to the Jewish nation.

World sales in 1989 soared to its highest level ever at \$789,000,000 U.S. with Canadian sales attaining close to \$70,000,000. This year Canada has been allotted the task of selling \$100,000,000 or 10% of this year's world projected sales.

"Every community in Canada will have to search its inner soul in order to achieve this lofty goal", remarked <u>Julius Briskin Q.C.</u>, National Executive V.P. and General counsel of State of Israel Bonds.

"We have been assured by the Ministry of Finance of Israel that every cent in Bond proceeds will be used to absorb Soviet Jews through home building and job creation," Briskin added.

The Answer Is In Your Hand By Rabbi Michael Wolff

The story goes that a little boy caught a small butterfly and trapped it in one of his hands. He held out both of his hands to his father and asked his father to guess which hand the butterfly was in. The father replied "The answer is in your hands.

People tell me that they are sorry to see me leave. They say that while my leaving is good for me, it is bad for Moncton. I usually do not know how to answer but now I give the question back to the community by saying the answer is in your hands.

Moncton is a terrific, vibrant community. We have a renovated Shul building and, soon, a new kitchen. We have a Cheder with 25 children, and 8 more who could start in September. We have a young adult population (ages 14 - 30) of over 30 people. The synagogue has a good percentage of people who actively participate in different, albeit varied, aspects of Jewish life in Moncton. The issue for me is really in finding the ways to keep people involved.

The Moncton Jewish Community, in spite of its size and relative isolation, is unique. It is special because of its togetherness. The entire community interacts with one another. Every member is important and each is cherished. In fact the rabbi is not the backbone of the community. The foundation is the beautiful people who hold the Jewish community together. Each person in their own way helps out and has a role to play. The answer to the community's survival is in everyone's hands.

March of the Living

Eleven children from our communities participated in the March of the Living from April 18 to May 3, 1990.

In Poland, they saw the past - the horrors of the Holocaust - and there they followed the footsteps of our 6 million souls who perished. In Poland they vowed - Never again.

In Israel our eleven representatives saw the future. They saw what Israel could mean to the lost Holocaust generation - they saw what Israel is to every Jew in our generation.

North Sydney's Anne Blufarb is Looking for her Sister Luba By Emmanuel Zabar

In my travels throughout Atlantic Canada, I reached the North Sydney community where only a handful of Jewish families are living - one of them is the Blufarbs.

Richard and Anneown The Blue Star Traders shop - on Commercial Street,in North Sydney - struggling to keep on living in spite of the daily constant memories of their escape from the Holocaust. "I live with a deep feeling of guilt that I escaped while the others in my family perished," says Anne - who was 17 years old when her family lived before the German occupation. Nightmare memo-ries keep coming of Anne's father, Herman Zuckerman being lined together with other Jewish leaders of their community, shot dead and his body being dumped in a marsh. Memories of her mother, Freda, and two sisters - Leah and Luba - spared at first just because they were in charge of washing clothes for the German soldiers.

"The last I saw of my mother and sisters they were hiding in a basement bunker in the ghetto at Tarnopol, now occupied by the Soviet Union, but one man told me he had met my sister Luba after the war and since then I pray and hope to meet her. Luba would have been 15 years old at that time so she would have memories too of how we survived", says Anne

National Symposium on Community Development PEI Community Newsletter

Klara Elster and Evy Carnat attended the National Symposium on Community Development held at the Ottawa Jewish Community centre, June 1-3, 1990. The Symposium was open to all members of small Jewish communities and was sponsored by the National Small Communities Committee of Canadian Jewish Congress and the Ottawa Jewish Community Council.

Evy reports that the Symposium provided an excellent forum for networking with other Jews from small communities across Canada and sharing ideas about problems and successes in providing Yiddishkeit in small communities. Klara reports that the Symposium showed that small communities actually place proportionately more emphasis on Jewish values and family life than large communities; that smaller communities have more tolerance and emphasize what members have in common rather than their differences; and that parents tend to get more directly involved in the Jewish education of their children in small communities than in larger ones where more community facilities are readily at hand.

The Symposium was addressed by Gerry Weiner, Minister of State for Multiculturalism, among others, on initiatives his government is taking now that the Heritage Language Program (under which our Hebrew School received funding) has been cancelled. Other highlights included a tour of the exhibition "A Coat of Many Colours", and plenty of great Jewish food.

Calls on Churches to Combat Racism By Rev. James E. Leland, Fredericton

Sir: It is a sad day indeed in New Brunswick that an act of desecration was committed against the Tiferes Israel Synagogue in Moncton last Sunday [August 19, 1990].

This is but one of several incidents that have occurred throughout the Maritime Provinces. Several months ago, a doll was nailed to a cross with a sign which read, "Juden get out." A Maritime university had a book display during reading week featuring a number of antisemitic books. And, of course, anti-semitic material has been circulated in the province for several years now.

Last Sunday evening, the anti-semitic word expressed itself in a concrete action against the Jewish community with the spray painting of a swastika and anti-Jewish slogans on the exterior of the syna-

Currently there is a wave of antisemitism sweeping Europe, Russia, South America, the United States and Canada, to name a few areas. Some countries are responding to this menace with strict laws governing the promotion of hate literature. In certain areas of Canada the criminal code is being applied against those who would promote hatred against an identifiable group. However, in New Brunswick the justice department makes the claim that the criminal code regarding hate literature is unworkable here.

Why? Who knows? I think the time is long overdue for that which is unworkable to be made workable. Laws prohibiting the spread of hate literature will certainly not alone stop the spread of antisemitism and racism any more than lows against committing murder will stop murderers from murdering. However, strict workable laws governing hate lit-

erature would be an important step in the right direction.

Another step in the right direction is already being taken by the N.B. department of education with its Holocaust education program and its global studies course. But more can be done to strengthen those areas with the public school system.

The Christian churches in New Brunswick need to take a united stand against anti-semitism and racism, and prepare an ecumenical statement which not only condemns this social and moral evil, but which will call for provincial government action to begin to seriously tackle the problem that has been festering and manifesting itself in this province these past few years.

The Christian churches of New Brunswick need to also ecumenically prepare educational materials for their various constituencies, and make a solid commitment to educate their congregations in how to combat racism and anti-semitism.

Individual Christians in New Brunswick need to approach their churches and their provincial government with the request to take whatever appropriate steps are necessary to guarantee that racism and anti-semitism are not allowed to flow through the villages, towns and cities. Better to light one little candle than to curse the darkness.

I appeal then to the Roman Catholic and Anglican bishops, the moderators and presidents of the various Christian synods, conferences and conventions in New Brunswick to come together and work out ecumenically a plan to combat racism and anti-semitism in New Brunswick.

I am certain that the desecration of our Shul, which took place recently, was very upsetting to all members. The Board held an emergency meeting at noon on August 22nd and, after 1-1/2 hours of discussing the various alternatives available, decided to offer the reward and to hold a news conference. It was a very difficult decision to make, but I believe that the out-pouring of support given by various local business, political, religious and labour leaders confirmed that our going public on this issue was the correct decision.

On the same topic, late on the afternoon of the day on which this desecration

was discovered, I received a phone call from a Mr. Hugh Kirkgaard, who is currently Youth Director of this City's First Baptist Church. He was calling on behalf of the church's Senior Minister, Mark Parent, to "offer you our support". He told me how disturbed they were to hear about the incident and concluded by saying "If there's anything we can do by way of support, don't hesitate to call". It was most reassuring to hear that, and I told him so. Especially significant, of course, is the fact that until recently Dr. A. Patterson Lee was the Pastor at that church. He will be well remembered for his Letters to the Editor of the Moncton Times-Transcript, in support of Malcolm Ross.

I hope everyone saw the editorial in the Times-Transcript on August 25th. It was a good editorial, condemning racism and the desecration of our Synagogue.



Now Do You Understand?! from The Canada Israel Committee's Insider

Among the reasons for hostile Arab talk are: the competition between Egypt, Syria and Iraq for leadership of the Arab world (Saddam Hussein's threat to incinerate half of Israel, for example, captured the imagination of the depressed Arab masses, making him an instant hero); Iraq's need to show its military prowess to deter Iranian aggression (by threatening Israel, Saddam indirectly warns Iran of his might); Saddam's growing fear of Israeli strikes against his chemical and nuclear facilities; Mubarak's fear that a conservative Israeli government will put an end to the process of Arab-Israeli negotiation that he has championed, thereby undermining Mubarak's claim to pivotal leadership in regional affairs; and real or imagined Arab fear of the "threat" of Soviet Jewish aliyah.

King Hussein, in particular, has undergone a transformation from pro-American "moderate" to pro-Iraqi belligerent. Hussein, apparently, really fears that the Likud agenda aims at effecting the "Jordan is Palestine" thesis. Soviet Jewish aliyah, he thinks, will overwhelm the territories, forcing the expulsion of hundreds of thousands of Palestinians from the West Bank to the East Bank, fomenting revolution in Jordan, and lead-

ing to the demise of the Hashemite Kingdom.

So, King Hussein has gone on the offensive, accusing Israel of leading the region to war. And, in order to protect himself he's embraced Iraq, allowing the establishment of a joint Iraqi-Jordanian air force squadron, and going along with the hard-line rhetoric of the Baghdad summit. He's even taken to re-writing history, telling the New York Times that the Six Day War was a deliberate "trap set by Israel into which the Arabs fell". He then went on, to warn that the Arabs may again "fall" into war. "(We) may have no other choice", Hussein said.

Some analysts believe that Hussein's real design is to scare other Arab countries into providing him with massive financial assistance as a "frontline confrontation state" against Israel. In order to squeeze the badly needed funds from Riyash and others, this analysis posits, Hussein has cynically manufactured false fears of Israeli aggression and impending regional war. The trouble is that having created a bogey, Hussein and other Arab leaders may be forced to follow through on their threats against Israel in order to prove their "virility" to the masses.

Jews in Arab Lands A Concern for CJC By Mike Cohen, CJC National Director of Communications



The National Jews in Arab Lands Committee of CJC is concerned with the welfare of those Jews who live in Arab countries. The Jews in these communities exist in a variety of conditions, ranging from the harsh, repressive regime of Syria to the relatively enlightened monarchy of Morocco, where Jews live comfortably and Israelis can visit. For the most part, the circumstances in these Jewish communities are not well-known in Canada. Many of its Jews live in isolation, cut off from their own families who have emigrated,

and from other Jewish communities. The committee, chaired by Rabbi Dr. Reuven Bulka of Ottawa, is mandated to collect current information about Jews living in these lands, to educate the Jewish and general community, and to consider appropriate action that might ameliorate the situation.

Jews have lived in what is today Egypt, Syria, Jordan, Lebanon, Libya, Iran, Iraqand North Africa for over 3,000 years. Under Arab rule Jews have known decades of prosperity and growth as well as anti-Jewish discrimination, violence and severe persecution. In 1945, there were more than 870,000 Jews living in these lands. Today, less than 80,000 Jews remain in the Moslem world.

The committee has representation from across the country. The Atlantic region rep is Messod Salama of St. John's, Newfoundland.

Recipe Corner

Special for Rosh Hashanah By Freda Perlin

BLUEBERRY CAKE

4 eggs 3 t. baking powder 1 1/4 c. sugar 1/2 c. orange juice 3/4 c. oil 2-3 c. dry blueberries 1/2 t. salt rind of 1 or 2 oranges 2 1/2 c. flour

Mix berries with 1/2 c. flour and set aside. Beat eggs about 2 min. and gradually add sugar. Beat really well. Add oil and then flour and orange juice alternately. Then fold in rind and blueberries.

Bake in well greased 12" Bundt pan or can be baked in 13x9x2 pan. Bake 350° for 45-60 min.

Can be iced with any icing you prefer!

ALMOND STICKS

2 c. flour 2 tsp. sugar 1 egg 1/4 tsp. salt 1/2 c. sugar 1 egg white 3/4 c. butter or parvenu margarine 1/2 t. baking powder 2 pkgs. (100 gram) unblanched almonds


Method:

Either in processor or by hand cut butter into dry ingredients. Add 1 egg and knead well. Set aside.

Meantime coarsely chop almonds and add 1/2 c. sugar and mix well. Beat egg white stiff and fold almond mixture into it. Roll dough medium thick (1/4") spread wet mixture over dough. Then cut into fingers either by sharp knife or rectangular cookie cutter.

Bake on lightly greased cookie sheet on 375° oven 15-20 min. (watch after 10 min.).

We hope it will be ready till the end of 1991.

Next year we expect to get for our school the house of the pre-war jewish gymnasium. Now there is a school for disabled latvian children for whom the government is searching a new house. Of course, we need a lot of money to bring the house in order, to get enough books for the children.

We have now a library in our society, we have got many books from Israel, Canada etc., but we have to find a bigger place - now the library has only one small room in our society. Now I want to finish. If you are interested in some more news about our work, please write to us, and I shall try to answer to all your questions.
