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### From the Desk of the **Executive Director**

Tovember has always been a somber month. The realization that winter is settling in over the North Atlantic - the temperature falling, the darker days, have always brought out the harsh reality of life on

the Atlantic Coast in the winter. Remembrance Day, standing on Barrington Street watching the Veterans march by year after year, their ranks growing thinner, I sometimes see my own life going by, the years beating away with the marching cadence as the Vets turn in to the Cenotaph for the ceremony. I guess all of us have dates that are indelible in our lives. The birth or death of a loved one of course, but events of significance either to ourselves or mankind in general.

I shall always remember where I was in November 1963, when as a teenager in high-school I heard JFK was shot, and unfortunately the day November 4th, 1995, the day Yitzhak Rabin was killed, will become an indelible signpost on my memory. Not only did we lose a great leader, but the Jewish people, in my mind, lost a piece of ourselves, our innocence, our belief that one Jew couldn't wouldn't and shouldn't kill another has been forever shattered.

It's been a month since that bleak Saturday, the tears have flowed, the eulogies have been spoken, the articles written and yet, there on Mt. Herzl lies the earthly remains of a Jewish General and Prime Minister shot down in Tel Aviv, Israel by a fellow Jew for "the sake of survival of the Jewish State." For me this is unsettling and will be difficult to reconcile for many years to come. My hope is that Rabin did not die in vain and that Israel will find a just and lasting peace with its neighbours some time in the near future.


As we approach the Chanukah Season when we celebrate the Festival of Freedom, there is an ominous force of reactionary, almost evangelical, religious fervor rising from a small segment

of the Christian population here in Nova Scotia arguing for the right to provide religious instruction in public schools, this of course being Christian religious education. Such organizations as the Christian Education Organization want the right to have public schools offer religious and moral instruction. Now I realize this is a very ticklish situation as Christianity is by far the religion of the majority of our neighbours. For years the AJC has maintained the position that religion should not be taught in the public schools but in the homes and places of worship. However, should a school want to hold religious education before or after regular hours, well then what? Are we against Christmas carols and concerts? White Christmas and The Christmas Song were written by Jews. What's wrong with the message 'Peace on Earth, Good Will Towards Men?"

Our AJC Community Affairs Committee is monitoring the situation and I ask any of our readers who have opinions or feel pressured by their local school districts or whose children are made uncomfortable to contact me immediately, no matter where in Atlantic Canada.

So my friends, as we light the candles on December 18, may you and your families be blessed with a Happy Chanukah. May 1996 bring peace, good health, and prosperity to the Jewish Community of Atlantic Canada and Kol Israel.

The death of Yitzhak Rabin will stand as one of the great tragedies of modern Jewish history. Throughout the world, leaders sang praises of this great warrior. This was a man most comfortable in the company of soldiers - a man who had the foresight to see the value of peace. # Canadian Jewish Congress Report

anadian Jewish Congress President Goldie Hershon and CJC National Executive Director and General Counsel Jack Silverstone met with Krzyztof Sliwinski, Poland's new ambassador at large for Polish-Jewish relations recently. Discussions revolved around the March of the Living, the preservation of Jewish cemeteries, the planned establishment of a Jewish museum in Warsaw, requests for restitution of communal and private Jewish properties, the situation at the Auschwitz museum and the teaching of Jewish and Polish history, including the Holocaust, in Jewish and Polish schools and the general state of Polish-Jewish relations following the recent Presidential election.

Ms. Hershon has been extraordinarily busy these past few months, traveling to Israel for the funeral of Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin. She and four other Jewish community leaders were the guests aboard the plane of Prime Minister Jean Chretien. In the wake of Prime Minister Rabin's assassination, the national officers adopted a resolution in which it called upon Jewish leadership in Israel, Canada and throughout the Diaspora to make every effort to enhance the quality of discussion on all issues of concern to the Jewish community and Israel, however contentious, and debate be conducted in an atmosphere of civility, mutual respect, tolerance and dignity. Immediately upon her return from Israel,. Ms. Hershon flew to Fredericton to address a community memorial for the slain Prime Minister.

Elsewhere on the CJC agenda, the National Unity Committee will be working with its regional members to pursue some activity in light of the Quebec referendum results. Representatives from the Atlantic Jewish Council were part of the discussions on the issue at the last meeting of the CJC National Executive in Toronto.

In the diplomatic circles Ms. Hershon has held meetings with ambassadors to Kuwait, Mauritania, Cuba, Morocco, Egypt, Germany and Poland.

Notes: CJC is awaiting the Supreme Court decision on the Malcolm Ross case ... CJC has been participating actively in the Somalia Inquiry in Ottawa, dealing with the racist activity of Canada's military ... Ms. Hershon and Mr. Silverstone will represent CJC at the World Jewish Congress Global Conference in Israel in January.





# Ben Medjuck remembered as 'pillar of community'

Ben Medjuck would want to be remembered as a man who gave something back to his community, his son said yesterday.

"He loved the community and wanted to give as much back to it as he could," Joe Medjuck said about his father who died Sunday at the age of 84.

"The things he was most proud of were things he did in Fredericton."

Mr. Medjuck operated several businesses including Medjuck's department store, once a fixture on Queen Street, until his retirement in 1970. But it was his involvement in community affairs for which he will be best remembered.

"I couldn't say enough good about the man," remarked Fredericton businessman Richard Tingley.

"He was just one of those people that you look up to and have tremendous respect for, a pillar of the community."

Mr. Medjuck helped found the Capital Y's Men's Club and the Fredericton Chamber of Commerce.

He served 10 years on the district school board as chairman of the building committee. He was a former chairman of the annual United Appeal, president of the Sgoolai Israel Synagogue and chairman of the Israeli Bond Drive.

He was honoured in 1977 with the Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Citizen Award.

Born in Glubokie, Poland, Mr. Medjuck emigrated to Canada as a 10-year-



old boy in 1921 and settled in New

Waterford, N.S.

In 1936 he married Faye Claener and moved to Fredericton where he

lived the rest of his life.

"He was an immigrant who came here and was very aware of what it was like in other countries and how few places there were as good as this, if any," said Joe Medjuck, a Hollywood movie producer who now lives in Los Angeles.

"He loved Fredericton. I will remember him as a wonderful father and a wonderful man."

Ben Medjuck was a Shriner and member of the Luxor Temple as well as a member of the Fredericton Chapter No. 2 Royal Arch Masons and Hiram Lodge No. 6 F and AM. He was a member of the Fredericton Golf Club and Maritime Seniors Golf Association.

He is survived by his wife, Faye; one son, Joseph; two daughters, Gertrude Cohos of Calgary and Marilyn Medjuck of Oakville, Ont.; two brothers, Morris Medjuck of Johannesburg, South Africa and Isaac Medjuck of Brooklyn, N.Y.; five grandchildren, four great-grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

He was predeceased by his parents, a sister, Nettie Saskins, and a brother, Bernard Medjuck.

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# Memorial services for Rabin held in Fredericton

Canadian Jewish Congress President Goldie Hershon didn't have to go into detail when talking about the sorrow experienced in Israel during the funeral for assassinated prime minister Yitzhak Rabin.

"There wasn't a dry eye in the house," Mrs. Hershon recalled.

Mrs. Hershon was the guest speaker at a public memorial service for the late prime minister at the Hugh John Flemming Forestry Center attended by approximately 200 people.

Among them were members of the Jewish community, politicians, members of The Royal Canadian Legion and Lt.-Gov. Margaret McCain.

Prime Minister Rabin was fatally shot at a peace rally Nov. 4. Yigal Amir, a right-wing Jewish student, has con-

fessed to the killing and several other suspects are being held in connection with the slaving.

Even though Mrs. Hershon was thankful to mourn with fellow Jews in the homeland, her visit was emotionally draining. "I don't know if it has sunk in yet," she said. "I still don't refer to him as the late Prime Minister Rabin. I'm not ready for that quite yet."

One of some 5,000 people to attend the former prime minister's funeral, Mrs. Hershon traveled with a small Jewish delegation on a private flight with Prime Minister Jean Chrétien.

The prime minister only hours before had barely avoided a knife-wielding intruder at his official residence in Ottawa.

Mrs. Hershon, who marveled at this irony, was

impressed with Prime Minister Chretien's spirit during his time of personal distress.

Despite the sadness associated with such an event, it was amazing to witness the massive representation at the funeral as dignitaries from around the globe paid their respect, she said.

"Before the funeral started, I was in awe. Here was President Clinton, President Bush... here was President Carter, Prince Charles, Prime Minister Major, Helmut Kohl. I was sitting right there with all of them. I thought to myself, when would I ever be able to be in such an assembly sitting with these people?" Mrs. Hershon said.

This degree of support was evidence of Prime Minister Rabin's widespread influence and popularity, said Mrs. Hershon.

"I think it was an absolute tribute to a great statesman... these people came from 85 countries - some countries we haven't even heard of - and all their heads of state were there. It was really unbelievable," stated Mrs. Hershon, who also emphasized Israel's current state of unrest.

"The people are outraged. Even people who didn't believe in the peace process felt this (killing) is not the answer," added Mrs. Hershon.

# What is Chanukah?

he great philosopher-Rabbi, the Maharal of Prague raised some very strong questions concerning the Chanukah celebrations. He asked: From history it appears that the main accomplishment at the time of Chanukah was the successful battles of the Maccabeans against the Greek invaders of the Jewish homeland, Israel: the weak were pitted against the strong, and G\*D delivered the many into the hands of the few, the pure fighters subdued the impure and the arrogant fell before the students of the Torah. The Jewish victories and physical survival should be celebrated. So why is the main celebration of Chanukah carried out simply with the lighting of the oil lamp (the candles and menorah)? Also what is the significance of specifically eight days of Chanukah?

During the time of the Greek Wars of oppression of the Jewish people and their Homeland Israel 2200 years ago, the Greeks chose four special items of the Jewish religion to prohibit. Upon pain of death, the Jewish people were forbidden to:

Keep the Shabbat day Holy (distinct), study Torah, perform Circumcision, and celebrate the New Moon Festivals. Why did the cruel Greeks specifically choose these items from all the Torah duties which a Jew performed?

The purpose of the Greek conquest was to transform the entire world into their philosophy of living. This is called Hellenization. There are some Torah duties which stand up by their very essence and are no tin line with Greek philosophy and non-Jewish appreciation of life. These particular Mitzvoths, the Greeks tried to eradicate.

1) The Greeks followed the natural world. The Greeks said that essentially every day is similar. The sun rises and sets the same every day in the week. The Greeks felt that there is no time that is Holy and special in its very essence. The Jewish people were saying and proclaiming with their actions that the Shabbat is a unique period of time. It is different from other days. Shabbat is blessed and holy and the Jewish people accomplish special things on Shabbat --- very different from the wee day. It is innately imbued with holiness. Jews get dressed up with their "Shabbat best," have special high quality food in honour of Shabbat, and abstain from creative work with the material world. Through this time of holiness, they feel The Divine. (Derech Ha Shem - Luzatto) The Greek festival-time for their major gods

were not innately holy time.

2) The study of Torah is a Mitzvah for every Jew. If one knows something, why learn it again; why study the material? It is redundant! However, we see that even if one know the particular Biblical thought which they are presently learning, still, one must study it. [Of course if one studies again, one will hopefully see new and creative ideas, because Torah is infinite and like a precious jewel, it is multi-dimensional.] The Greek approach was to follow the natural approach: If one knows the material then one should not bother to study it again. In addition, the Torah is so Divinely connected that if one studies it and does not remember what one studied, it still remains a Mitzvah, and one has also accomplished a great thing, for Torah study is reading Divine Thoughts and is a connection to holiness. The Greek approach was that if you do not remember, then you have accomplished nothing because you are lacking clear knowledge of the material. In addition, the study of Torah for its own sake will complete the very essence of a person's soul. (Nefesh HaChaim)

3) The Greeks said that a naturally physically born person is physically complete. Do not tamper with the body. The Jews say that the same as we say that the body is incomplete, so is the personality (soul) of a person incomplete. The Mitzvah of circumcision completes the body, even though it is contra naturally-formed man. Plato only dealt with the apprehension of the good, whereas the Jewish religion says that humans are "beings that are becoming" and improving according to Divinely revealed values (G\*D's Revelation of Mount Sinai). This, the Jew chooses and lives by, and thereby elevates him/herself to a higher level.

4) Speciality of natural time for the Greeks is not within man's domain to alter. A human can not change the reality of living with the cosmos as they are. However, The Almighty says that the Jewish approach to the New Moon Festival (Rosh Chodesh) is based upon the human dimension and decision. Whenever the Beit Din of Jerusalem would declare the New Moon (the New Month), that became the month. This would be effective even if it did not coincide exactly with nature's reality. Such would be the case if there was a cloudy day and the waxing of the moon in Jerusalem was impossible to visualize, and so the New Month was delayed by one day's proclamation because the human High Jewish Court (Beit Din) so declared it. The Jewish Judges knew that the exact day of the New Month commenced the day before, but they declare and kept the next day because of the Torah Rules for New Moon Festivals. This was above and beyond nature. Albeit, Aristotle spoke about overcoming nature, but it was not the Divine Elevation of the human that he was referring

Thus, we see that Jewish spiritual living was indeed opposed to the Greek Hellenic natural would order. The Greeks believed in self evident natural instincts. The Jew's task was to transcend nature and rise above it to Holy levels. That is why circumcision preferably takes place on the eighth day. Eight is one above the seven of the natural world order. That is why the menorah is lit for eight days. Oil was chosen to celebrate the miracle, because it was only because of the separation, the anti-Hellenistic approach of those few courageous Jews, the Maccabeans, that we have Chanukah. The same as oil and water do not mix, Jewish living and Hellenism do not mix. G\*D said: "And I will separate you from the nations of the world." The Hasmoneans had oil available, but it was plain oil and not holy oil, intact with the seal of the high priest. So they searched and only found one such cruse. Ordinary oil was not

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### **UJA** kick-off a success

The 1995 Atlantic Canada United Jewish Appeal goal should be much easier to reach if the enthusiasm generated by the launch translates to dollars.



More than 150 Halifax community members crowded the Lord Nelson Hotel ballroom (September 17) to hear the Dor L'Dor singers of Israel complete their cross-Canada tour with a song and video presentation highlighting life in Israel today.

Alan Pakes, a Canadian working for the Jewish Agency in Israel, assembled the cast of five Israeli professional musicians and one Canadian, Laura Levin of Hamilton, a 17-year-old high school student who spent six months in Israel and narrated the program.

Pakes, who helped write, produce and direct the 45-minute show, "Across The Generations", said, "We wanted to put Israel back into the Jewish community. The show has been presented in South Africa (with a South African acting as narrator) and in six cities across Canada."

The program drew a turn-away crowd at Toronto's Ford Theatre, a sellout house in Hamilton, several hundred in Ottawa, Winnipeg and Vancouver and a large, young leadership group in Montreal.

"We have the potential to take it to England and Australia but I'm tired," laughed Pakes, who, with the five musicians, was returning to Israel the day after the Halifax show. Levin,


who spent her six months in Israel on a Camp Ramah program, will finish high school in Hamilton this year and then pursue a university education.

"The message I want to convey in my narration (which is done as a letter to her grandmother who assisted her Israeli trip) is how important it is for teens to go to Israel and experience it first hand, rather than hear about the package as we do now. You just don't comprehend what Israel is all about until you're there."

Victor Goldberg, co-chairman (with Mark Rosen) of the Halifax area fund drive, said the 1995 fund goal is about \$270,000, excluding special gifts. "But the important thing for us to do is to maintain meaningful gifts from eligible donors, to enlarge the base of givers. We have a new group of volunteers in our campaign, a women's division for the first time in several years (chaired by Ethel Cooper-Rosen and Annalee Cohen), and will hold a children's march and a series of parlor meetings to generate enthusiasm and funds."

The regional goal is close to \$600,000, said Atlantic regional chair Jim Spatz of Halifax. "We have three goals - to strengthen Israel, to fund the rescue of Jews in peril, and to strengthen our own community youth programs right here in Atlantic Canada to retain our continuity."

During the metro Halifax kickoff, the audience heard from 1994 March of the Living participant **Ann Raskin** of Halifax, who will spend 1995-96 in Israel. "I come from a small community where our major connection to Jewishness is our annual summer at Camp Kadimah with Jewish friends from the region and across the continent. This year will be important to me for my continuity as a Jewish person and to retain my Jewish identity.

# Report from Newfoundland

There she stood, clothed in the scarlet robes of a Ph.D., a pillar of strength despite her diminutive stature and advanced age. We held our breaths; Grunya Movschovitch Ferman knelt before the Chancellor of Memorial University, Mr. John Crosbie, and became Dr. Ferman, Honoris Causa. How distant in time, space and mood from those days of living in the forest as a partisan where "snow, many times" was her blanket. There she met her husband, the late Lewis Ferman, an electrician. Lewis, who had lost his first wife and child, became an expert at demolition work. I still remember the strength of his handshake when he was 80 years of age; it took me several minutes to regain the feeling in my fingers.

Several minutes later, Moshe Kantorowitz took Mrs. Ferman's place before the Chancellor. He, also, became Doctor, Honoris Causa, for his work in educating Newfoundlanders and Labradorians about the Holocaust. As a teenager, he had been deported to Auschwitz. Although the other 51 members of his family lost their lives, Mr. Kantorowitz survived long

enough to be liberated by the Americans.

After the war, both the Fermans and the Kantorowitzes found their way to Newfoundland. Both families still speak warmly of the many years they spent in their Atlantic refuge.

Both Mrs. Ferman and Mr. Kantorowitz had been nominated by Mr. Ern Condon, a guidance counselor in a Catholic school in Labrador. Mr. Condon had taken part in the "Holocaust and Hope" tour for educators sponsored by the B'nai B'rith League for Human Rights. This tour took him to Germany, Poland and Israel.

For the members of the Jewish Community in St. John's, the weekend of October 27th is never to be forgotten. It started with Shabbes dinner for 28 at Judy Wilansky's and continued

Once again the whole audience stood with him. Somehow the Israeli flags that our group was waving seemed to truly fit the moment. I am pleased to say that Michael did go on to become the silver medalist for the second year at Skate Canada. As he was presented his silver medal, the Israeli flag was held at half mast in tribute to Rabin.

### Gift of Israel is Launched

On September 28th, the Gift of Israel was officially launched across Canada in Montreal. It was the inauguration of a number of unique and special partnerships: the ongoing relationship between the Jewish Federations across Canada and the United Israel Appeal of Canada, the beginning of a unique partnership between all Canadian Jewish Federations and the CRB Foundation who had worked closely together for some time in preparation for the introduction of this programme, and the beginning of a special alliance between the CRB Foundation, the Canadian Jewish community and the Bank of Montreal.

These partnerships are significant because of the recognition by all parties that the exposure of our youth to Israel programmes cannot only strengthen their Jewish identity but can make them better people and better citizens. The worldliness which travel experiential programmes impart can make our youth more sensitive to both the proud moments and the tragedies that have impacted our world and continue to affect these challenging times in Israel, Canada, and other parts of the world.

The CRB Foundation conducted a recent survey of individuals who participated in Israel travel programmes over the past eight years. It showed that such travel accomplished an increased level of Jewish identification and feelings towards Israel and significantly improved humanistic values. Participants became much more involved in both the Jewish community and the general community, and while they had increased feelings of Jewish pride and a connection to their religion, they had a stronger appreciation of the high quality of their lives in Canada.

Through the Gift of Israel, our children are stimulated, challenged and taught about the world in which we live, in addition to their Jewish heritage and themselves. An Israel experience is one of the most compelling elements in our identity as a Jew. The Gift of Israel offers an opportunity for many more of our Atlantic Canadian Jewish Youth to experience and sense the centrality of Israel on the Jewishness in their lives.

The Atlantic Jewish Council has worked for many months towards a financial arrangement with the United Israel Appeal of Canada which would encourage our teens to register and participate in the Gift of Israel. Early in November, our efforts were realized when an agreement was reached and the Gift of Israel was ready for launching here in Atlantic Canada.

When a participant joins the Gift of Israel, United Israel Appeal and Atlantic Jewish Council together earmark their funds internally on an annual basis. Once a participant registers for any of the forty approved Israel experiences, UIA/AJC forward the matching amounts to the specific Israel purveyor with a \$200 bonus from UIA at that time. The maximum grant of \$1000 from UIA/AJC is contingent on the participant contributing a dollar for dollar matching amount on an annual basis to their personal Bank of Montreal Gift of Israel Account. The maximum that a student would receive in total is

\$1200, representing approximately 30% of the trip cost (assuming a cost of an average programme of \$4000). This amount is the same for both the Savings Programme and the Bar/Bat Mitzvah Registry. The participant's Gift of Israel Account accrues interest annually and may be used until age 23. Should the participant choose not to participate in this programme for any reason, the principal and interest are withdrawn by the participant and the account is closed. All matching funds from UIA/AJC are canceled.

On November 14th, the Gift of Israel Bar/Bat Mitzvah Registry was officially launched in Halifax when Joseph Herschorn, a Bar Mitzvah celebrant, became the first Atlantic Jewish youth to officially register with the Atlantic Jewish Council in the Gift of Israel programme and became its first participant. During his Bar Mitzvah ceremony, the President of the Shaar Shalom Synagogue, Dr. Martin Zelenietz, presented Joseph with a Gift of Israel Enrollment Certificate and announced that the Shaar Shalom Synagogue was pleased to participate in this worthwhile programme and would contribute to Joseph's Bar Mitzvah Registry. This was an important milestone for it showed the commitment of the local Synagogue to the Gift of Israel and acceptance to make enrollment in the Gift of Israel standard practice for every young person by the time the youth reaches Bar or Bat Mitzvah age.

Although your child may be years away from actually participating in an organized Israel teen trip, your community has created an exciting way to begin the planning process. # **Holocaust Memorial Stamp unveiled**

There were tears in some eyes Thursday, November 9, as a new 45-cent stamp commemorating the Holocaust was inaugurated on Parliament Hill be-

fore an audience that included survivors of Nazi death camps.

The stamp, marking the 50th anniversary of the end of the Second World

War Nazi atrocities, is a collage of photos of death-camp inmates and includes a yellow Star of David, which the Nazis forced the Jews to wear.

A survivor of Auschwitz testified to the horrors he endured.

"I lost five brothers, two sisters, father, mother, uncles, aunts and cousins," **Philip Riteman** of Bedford told the audience in a halting voice.

"What the Nazis did, we can't forget."

As Riteman spoke, his pauses grew longer and he finally faltered:

"I have no words to speak...I thank the government for issuing this stamp."

The Parliament Hill ceremony came 57 years after Kristalnacht, the Night of the Broken Glass, when Nazi stormtroopers rampaged through German cities, burning synagogues and smash-

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# Riteman attends stamp unveiling

A Bedford man who survived five Nazi death camps was in Ottawa for the unveiling of a new Canadian stamp com-

memorating the 50th anniversary of the end of the Holocaust.

"I don't know why they picked me," a surprised **Philip Riteman** said.

"I was shocked when they told me."

Mr. Riteman speculated he was chosen to represent Holocaust victims because he tells his story in schools throughout the region to educate young people about the dark era in 20th-century history.

Mr. Riteman, now in his late 60s, weighed only 75 pounds when he was liberated from his Nazi captors in Bavaria on May 2, 1945 after four years of imprisonment.

Originally from the small Polish town of Shereshew, Mr. Riteman, now a successful businessman, lost his parents, five brothers, two sisters, nine

aunts and uncles and a number of cousins to the gas chambers and ovens in the infamous concentration camps.

He still has nightmares about the deaths he saw and the inhumanity he experienced first-hand in places such as Auschwitz, Dachau and Birkenau - names that have become synonymous with evil.

Mr. Riteman said he had few details about the unveiling, which coincided with the anniversary of Krystallnacht, the November 9, 1938 "night of the broken glass" when the Nazis

began the widespread killing of Jews that culminated in the mass murders in the death camps.

"I'll thank them for giving me the honour of representing millions killed by the Nazis and survivors in Canada," he said, adding that Jews were not the only victims of the Holocaust.

ing Jewish-owned shops and homes. The shards of broken windows littering the pavement gave the night its name.

"It was the beginning, the unfortunate beginning of a terrible time for the Jewish people and for the people of the world," said Rabbi Reuven Bulka. "It was a time a demon was let loose."

Eleanor Gitzler of the Holocaust Education and Memorial Centre in Toronto, said Canada turned a deaf ear to the plight of European Jews as the clouds of war gathered in the late 1930's. Some refugees were turned away from Canada.

"Canada has learned from the lessons of the Holocaust," she said.

"Millions of innocent non-Jews were killed by the Nazis."

The commemorative stamp features a collage of emaciated faces representing millions of people victimized by the Holocaust and includes a tattered yellow Star of David 'Jude' badge used to single out Jews for mistreatment.

Mr. Riteman said the assassination of Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, gunned down by a Jewish extremist after attending a peace rally in Tel Aviv, shows that the world is still in turmoil.

"It's a tragedy," he said. "I was crying all day."

He was particularly troubled that Mr. Rabin's murderer was a fellow Jew.

"That's terrible," he said. "It's never happened before in my life."

Mr. Riteman's son Larry, chairman of the Canadian Jewish Congress's Atlantic Region Holocaust Remembrance Committee, said November 9 also marked the beginning of the 1945 Nuremberg war crimes trials, which opened in the same week that agreemaent was being reached on organizing the United Nations.

"It's an appropriate time to think about how we measure up," he said.

A ceremony commemorating those who died on Krystallnacht was held Thursday November 9 at Province House.

In the spring of 1996, thousands of Jewish youth from all corners of the world will gather together in Poland and Israel for an experience that will last a lifetime. Forgetfulness leads to Exile while Remembrance is the secret of Redemption Hasidic Saying In Poland the group's visit will culminate with the "March of the Living" on Holocaust Remembrance Day, as they march together the 3-kilometre distance separating Auschwitz from Birkenau. In Israel participants will celebrate the creation of the State of Israel on Independence Day along with thousands of other teenagers from Israel and other parts of the world. You could be one of the 350 Canadian high school students privileged to take part in this event.

# Israeli captures Silver in memory of Rabin

Hours after his Prime Minister was killed by an assassin, Israel's Michael Shmerkin turned in the performance of a lifetime to capture an unexpected silver medal at Sun Life Skate Canada.

Mr. Shmerkin, ranked eleventh in the world, nearly pulled out of the event upon hearing of Mr. Rabin's assassination Saturday.

Upon skating onto ice at Harbour Station, 5,500 fans stood in a silent tribute to the 25-year-old soldier mourning his national leader. Mr. Shmerkin stood with his head lowered as if in prayer before the medal contender began his free skate. It was a spec-

tacular performance that drew fans out of their seats for a standing ovation. Some waved the blue and white flags of Israel.

"I skated well, considering. Now I'm in shock," said Mr. Shmerkin through an interpreter following his routine.

Asked what made him decide to skate rather than pull out of the competition, Mr. Shmerkin paused in thought and then

answered.

"I decided to skate because I knew people came to see me and I was sure there would be a lot of Jewish people in the audience. I decided to skate in memory of the Prime Minister.

"He opened the way to free-dom," he said.

Mr. Shmerkin had not yet spoken with anyone from home. He lives in Metulla, a city near the border of Syria and Lebanon.

Mr. Shmerkin, who has been a pioneer for figure skating in Israel, compared himself to Mr. Rabin. Like himself, the skater said, Mr. Rabin was trying to start something new.

"Camel riding in Canada is like skating in Israel," he said.

"[Mr. Rabin] went in the peace street and I went in the figure skating street. I'm always in front of things so I have a responsibility."

And Israelis, waving their country's flag in the stands, said he did the right thing by skating.

"He did a great thing for his country," said Avigail Ram, who now lives in Ottawa. "He showed the whole world that Israel is alive and well."


The Toronto rally takes place in mid December. Other rally's are planned for Montreal and Boston.

# Israel Zangwill and his Nova Scotia connection

The year 1995 marks the hundredth anniversary of the publication of a book which holds a special interest for the Jewish community in the Atlantic Region. The book, entitled *The Master*, was written by Israel Zangwill (1864-1926), Jewish writer and passionate activist on behalf of the Jewish people - a personal friend of Theodor Herzl and vigorous

supporter of the Zionist movement in its formative stages. In fact, political Zionism is sometimes said to have been born on the foggy evening of November 1895 when Herzl came from Vienna to talk to Zangwill in his cluttered studio in North London

Zangwill was born and raised in London's poor Jewish district of Whitechapel, and forged a distinguished career for himself as a literary and political figure. When he wrote The Master, he had already established a reputation with his earlier book, Children of the Ghetto, a highly acclaimed novel about the life of London Jews. This novel, and many of his other works, can be found in most Jewish community libraries in Canada and the US

The Master, however, is not set in London, neither does it deal with Jewish life. It was, for this reason, treated by various critics as a less important work. But for people in Atlantic Canada it has

the special interest of being a story about a boy who grows up in a small Nova Scotia village near Truro, and who, after many hardships, eventually becomes a famous

painter in London. The book offers colorful descriptions of Nova Scotia scenery, and many details about life in the village, and in other places, including Economy, Parrsboro, Halifax and even Saint John.

None of this would appear in the least unusual, if Zangwill had paid a visit to Nova Scotia prior to writing the book. But, since he had never visited these parts, the book was thought to be either a product born of Zangwill's imagination, or, according to some historians, a fictionalized account of the life

of Halifax born painter Gilbert Stuart Newton who died in London sixty years earlier. A historic plaque, indicating a connection with Newton, was placed on the site of The Nova Scotia College of Art and Design in Halifax.

However, my own research has brought to light a connection with another Nova Scotia artist who went to London and became a successful painter and illustrator. This man was George Hutchinson, who grew up in Great Village, Col-

chester County, and who

was Zangwill's personal friend and an illustrator of many of his most successful books.

such as the humorous King of Schnorrers, about the rich and the poor among eight-eenth-century London Jews, still popular and reissued in New York with Hutchinson's illustrations in 1987.

Thus a collaboration developed between the London writer and the Nova Scotia artist, and resulted in a series of eye-catching illustrations on one hand, and a novel based on the artist's life-story, on the other hand. But somehow the connection between Zangwill and his illustrator became forgotten

over the hundred years separating us from the book's publication, and the story of their friendship faded from memory. Yet it is worth re-discovering the story

now, for it throws a new light on the careers both of Zangwill and Hutchinson. Hutchinson is still remembered in Nova Scotia as a painter who grew up in Great Village and was the great-uncle of Elizabeth Bishop; Zangwill is remembered as an outstanding Jewish writer and thinker. And now, one hundred years after the publication of *The Master*, we have a good opportunity to re-connect in our minds these two talented individuals whose friendship bore fruit that can still be savored by us today.
