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

## CANADA and ISRAEL:

## **A Balanced Perspective**

The annual stocktaking incumbent on the advent of a new year finds Canada-Israel relations at September, 1983 "on hold". A relative calm - compared to one year ago - seems to prevail, as events in the Middle East have served to crystallize points of agreement and disagreement in the strong friendship between our two countries.

A quick-listening of the seven current fundamentals of Canada's Middle East policy, in which she seeks to present a posture of "even-handedness" between Israel and her Arab neighbors, is in order:

- (1) It is a fundamental cornerstone of Canadian foreign policy that Israel has the unqualified right to exist as a sovereign state, within secure and recognized borders, at peace with her neighbors, and that there be flourishing economic, cultural, social and personal relations between our two nations and their peoples.
- (2) The terms of any peace arrangements in the Middle East must be resolved by the parties to the conflict themselves, in direct negotiations.
- (3) Canada supports the Camp David Accords and the Regan Plan (to the extent it advances Camp David) as the only process which can lead to a meaningful peace in the region.
- (4) Just as the Israelis have rights, so, too, do the Palestinean residents of the West Bank and the Gaza strip, and these rights include a "homeland" within a defined territory (namely Gaza and the West Bank). Canada does not rule out a separate, new Palestinean state, if the parties agree (in this respect Canadian policy goes beyond the Reagan Plan).
- (5) Canada disagrees most strongly with the Israeli government's settlements policy in the West Bank (which it regards as illegal).

- (6) All foreign forces, including Israel, must pull out of Lebanon. Consequently, the recently concluded Lebanese-Israeli Treaty is applauded, and the refusal to withdraw by Syria and the PLO criticized.
- (7) Canada will not grant official recognition to the PLO as long as the PLO:
  - (a) refuses to recognize Israel's right to exist; and
  - (b) pursues terrorism as an instrument of policy.

Supporters of Israel should be aware that there is fundamental sympathy for the plight of the Palestinean people (as opposed to the PLO) amongst Canadians. This sentiment, motivated by Canadians' essentially decent approach to moral dilemas, should not be construed as being advocated at the expense of Israel, but rather of concurrent support - in the context of the "autonomy" spoken of in the Camp David Accords.

Nor should we be unmindful of the unpopularity of certain Israeli policies including Trade with South Africa and the supplying of arms to "reactionary" regimes in Central America - which twig the consciences of liberals in this country and provoke sporatic critical outbursts.

The special lesson to be gleaned from the events of the immediate past year is that a balanced perspective must be maintained in assessing the Canada-Israel relationship: There are no disagreements on the fundamentals; the differences on limited, specific policies and actions are the differences of good friends who can agree to disagree without rupturing their friendship.

The thirty-five years of warm Canada-Israel friendship see escalating economic, cultural, academic and people-to-people exchanges. While there has been criticism and counter-advocacy on behalf of her enemies, a vigilant and informed constituency of supporters of Israel remains the strongest assurance of continuing good relations on an enduring basis between Canada and the Jewish state.

On behalf of the Canada-Israel Committee, its Board of Directors, Officers and professional associates, it is my pleasure to extend warmest best wishes for the coming year.

## **SOVIET JEWRY**

Dear Mr. Medjuck,

I wish to thank you for your most informative letter of April 27 regarding your recent visit to the Soviet Union and your observation on restricted emigration from that country.

We are all too familiar with the situation of persons who are being denied their right to leave the Soviet Union and are persecuted for having tried to exercise that right. Canada has taken a firm stand at the Madrid Meeting of the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe with respect to human rights and fundamental freedoms, and on the implementation by all participating states of the provisions of the Helsinki Final Act promoting the free movement of people. We have protested the increasing repression in the Soviet Union and the severe curtailment of emigration which have become apparent in recent years. Our representations have been made in bilateral contacts with Foreign Minister Gromyko and senior Soviet officials as well as in multilateral forums such as the Madrid Meeting. The most recent public protest concerning restricted emigration and related persecution was lodged by the Head of the Canadian Delegation to the CSCE. On April 28, I met personally with representatives of the Canadian Parliamentary Spouses Committee on Soviet Jewry and American Congressional Wives, to draw public attention to Canadian Government views on the plight of Jews in the Soviet Union.

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Despite the difficulty of influencing Soviet positions on human rights and emigration matters, we have not abandoned hope of encouraging an evolution in official attitudes. However, the efforts by Canada and other Western Governments have not produced notable success in recent years. It would seem, in fact, that the Soviet authorities are not so sensitive to pressure applied by governments, either publicly or privately, as they are to strong expressions of public opinion in the West. We therefore consider it very important that individuals and organizations concerned with human

1917 Revolutions in February and October: the first leads to the abdication of Nicholas II and the end of 300 years of Romanov rule; a Provisional Government, headed by Alexander Kerensky, proclaims Russia a republic and removes all restrictions affecting Jews and other minorities; the U.S. immediately recognizes the new regime; the October coup, led by Lenin and Trotsky, overthrows the Kerensky government and establishes Bolshevik control of Russia.

1918 In signing the Brest-Litovsk treaty with Germany, Russia unilaterally withdraws from World War I.

1918-21 Years of Civil War; the Allies, horrified at the new regime's actions, briefly intervene in Russia in an attempt to overthrow the Bolsheviks; 200,000 Jews are killed in pogroms during the Civil War.

1918 The first Soviet Constitution creates a federation of Soviet National Republics: a Commissariat for Nationalities, containing a Jewish section, is established under the leadership of Joseph Stalin.

1919 The kehillah, the traditional Jewish communal organization, is abolished and its property is confiscated; Zionism is outlawed and the use of the Hebrew language is banned.

1920 Yiddish is given the status of an official language of the Soviet Union; the communist government begins a savage campaign against religious groups in the country; religious education of children is forbidden, churches and synagogues are

seized and converted into clubs, workshops and warehouses; Jewish schools of elementary and higher learning are closed.

1920-22 Famine

1921 The New Economic Policy: with Russia on the brink of economic collapse, Lenin retreats from communist practices; Jews, stripped of their means of livelihood, are urged to resettle on agricultural enterprises in Crimea and the Ukraine; a group of Hebrew writers, led by the poet laureate Hayyim Nachman Bialik, leaves Russia for Palestine.

1922 Russia is officially designated as the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics; Joseph Stalin becomes secretary-general of the Communist Party, beginning his rise to power.

1924 Lenin dies.

1926 51% of Jewish children are educated in Yiddish-language schools run by the government; colonization efforts are at their peak with some 35,000 Jews on agricultural settlements.

1927 More than a million copies of Yiddish newspapers are printed in the Soviet Union; Rabbi Schneersohn, leader of Habad Hassidism is imprisoned and later expelled from Russia.

1928 Stalin begins the Five Year Plan to expand Russia's economy and make her self-sufficient; Birobidzhan region in far eastern Siberia is designated as an area for Jewish settlement.

1929 Trotsky is exiled from Russia. 1930 Millions of kulaks, more prosperous peasants, are liquidated; the Jewish section in the Commissariat of Nationalities is





abolished.



In 1928, Birobidzhan was heralded as a "Russian Zion." These postmarks, on letters from Birobldzhan, testify to the failure of that dream. The first, dated August 9, 1935, bears the name of the region in Cyrillic and Hebrew characters, with the initials of the Jewish Autonomous Region on the side. The second, December 3, 1947, has USSR on the top, the word Birobidzhan in Russian and Yiddish, and the initials as before. The last, issued in 1955, has no Hebrew lettering, and makes no mention of the Jewish region.

## **BROTT GIVES CONCERT IN HALIFAX**

The internationally known Canadian conductor *Boris Brott* made a sold out appearance in June at the Shaar Shalom Synagogue. In an attempt to revitalize Jewish cultural life in the community, the 150 family congregation sponsored a concert of music on a Jewish theme with a professional orchestra of symphony musicians under the direction of Maestro Brott who is the resident conductor of the Hamilton Philharmonic.

Two soloists were featured on the program. *Mikhail Brat*, violinist, formerly of the Soviet Union and now with the Hamilton Philharmonic, played the Invocation and Chassidic Dance by the conductor's father, *Alexander Brott*. Brott, Sr. is conducted of the McGill Chamber Orchestra and the Kingston Symphony. He is also a well-known Canadian conductor, teacher and composer.

Kol Nidrei by Max Bruch was played by cellist *Shimon Walt* of the now defunct Atlantic Symphony Orchestra.

The program also included selections from "Fiddler on the Roof", Baal Shem by Bloch and Overture on Hebrew Themes by Prokofieff. The evening was greeted by a standing ovation of the Jewish and non-Jewish audience following the playing of Hatikvah.



The concert was made possible through special donations to the Symphony Musicians Trust Fund by the Eaton Foundation, Zeller's and the Birks Family Foundation.

A reception was held by the Congregation for the entire orchestra and the audience following the concert.

The concert was a highlight of the Halifax cultural season and helped to fill the void left by the collapse of the Atlantic Symphony Orchestralast year. However, it was not only unusual in that it featured music on a Jewish theme but included witty explanations before each piece in English and Yiddish by the conductor.

years, people have been talking about the idea of a Jewish summer day camp. Through the Lubavitch Youth Organization, we were able to receive a government grant. That impetus ended the talk.

In Halifax this summer, our very own Jewish day camp premiered. The attractions? A home base at the Beth Israel Synagogue, kosher cuisine, weekly outings (to Shubenacadie Wildlife Park and Camp Kadimah, for example), daily swimming lessons and a lot of fun. The schedule highlighted a miscellany of programs: Deaf Gypsy Mime, "Kids Express" and "Kids on the Block" puppet shows, encounters with clowns, visits from musicians, trips to museums, picnics in the park and, most importantly, Jewish children being together.

The staff, who have had previous experience as counsellors at Camp Kadimah and other Young Judaean youth camps, consisted of Marc Garson, Mike Collins, Miriam Alberstat and myself, as administrator/program director. Our resident advisor was Frank Medjuck, the person responsible for initiating this project. With the introduction of a Jewish day camp, the children's vicarious exposure to camp life has become a reality. The program, although still in its pioneering stage, has achieved its objectives. Now the groundwork has been laid for the future. Through time and experience, this program can continue to grow. Maybe next summer, other centers in the region will follow suit.

In the planning stages of this project, we realized the uncertainty with which we were faced. To us, the threat of competition from other non-Jewish day camps, summer cottages and family vacations was secondary. Foremost in our minds was: Given the opportunity, the facilities, the proper preparation and experienced staff, would the idea elicit any reaction? It was a risk, a chance of a loss or a gain . . . with a little to be lost and so much to be gained.

In retrospect, the day camp ran during the months of July and August, with the enrollment of five-to-seven year olds passing the twenty-camper mark. Looking back on those weeks, the results speak for themselves. Children's laughing voices were heard in the background. It was either Marc teaching them the words to the "Men at Work" albumn, or Mike leading some crazy game of "duck, duck, goose," or Miriam tracing their bodies for self-portraits in arts and crafts. Now the stage has been set. For "as our fathers planted for us, so do we plant for our children." (The Talmud)

## **FIRSTS**

Blue and white license plates neatly tacked to cars travelling through the streets of Halifax don the motto "Nova Scotia... Canada's Ocean Playground". To many, Halifax is a city that attracts thousands of tourists each year during the summertime. To us, however, Halifax is home. Tourists come here to vacation, to sightsee, and to enjoy the relaxed ambience. Have you ever wondered, though, where the residents go? More specifically, have you ever wondered what happens in the Jewish community during these months?

Throughout the course of the year, the Atlantic Jewish Council (AJC) has an extensive calender of events. In the summer months, it features the added dimension of Camp Kadimah. Under the auspices of the AJC, Camp Kadimah — the only Jewish camp in the Atlantic Region is opened each year for the summer.

Every year, for over forty years, Jewish children from all of the Atlantic provinces have flocked to Camp Kadimah to stay at their summer "home". During the six-week session, the campers are exposed to a variety of activities, which blend the fundamentals of any summer camp (sports, arts and crafts, drama, singing and dancing), with Zionist and Jewish content. For us, exposure to these elements is essential in order to develop an understanding and appreciation of being Jewish. ## AN OLD LANGUAGE AT NEW YEAR

It is almost a cliche that over the past century Yiddish has been buried repeatly but refuses to die.

I saw that absurdity mirrored in May, 1982, in Montreal, when, through the *Atlantic Jewish Council* I attended three days of the six-day conference—the previous one having been held in Jerusalem in 1976—of the World Council on Yiddish.

How odd, it seemed to me, that the gathering had gone through two days of sessions before the official opening session was held. Equally surprised were other delegates that Atlantic Canada could generate enough interest in the language to send a delegate.

No matter. If the achievement of a clear order of business remains in doubt, there is no question that we all gained a great deal of moral support from meeting one another and from hearing of one another's work.

Those present included, the originally non-Yiddish speaking family from Winnipeg, raising their children completely in Yiddish; the young Yiddish-speaking costume and makeup woman from Hollywood who wants to work in Yiddish theatre; the aged Brazilian who had headed Yiddish schools in Poland before World War II; his student, who now heads the Jewish State Theatre in Warsaw.

Yiddish in Halifax? There have been a number of interested students, as well as for Hebrew, and classes have been offered for both languages over the past two years. Right now there seem to be too few committed students to warrant the Jewish community's offering adult classes for either language. At the same time, the committed individuals have shown that instruction has been fruitful. They should be able to pursue their work as they did last year through the Atlantic Institute of Jewish Studies.

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## NEW YEAR MESSAGE FROM CANADIAN ZIONIST FEDERATION

Rosh Hashanah comes early this year, but not too early for me. With the way things have been going, they could have cancelled out last year altogether and I wouldn't have missed it at all. Mind you, personally, I can't complain. A couple of good things that I have been looking forward to all my life happened, both in the same week. I now know what it feels like to be married to a grandmother, thanks to my daughter, and my son graduated from college. Neither my son nor my grandson have a steady job yet, but both have well-to-do fathers, so why worry? The future will look after itself.

But, for the rest of all of us, it has been a forgettable year — that is if we could be allowed to forget. The impasse in Lebanon grinds on inexorable. Sabra and Shatilla have feared and scarred a generation. Some are more penitent than others, still others feel no penance is necessary. The media have had a "Field Day" at our expense and latent as well as patent animosities have squirted to the surface like pus from a festering boil.

All over the world, the tocsin bells of anti-Semitism have been unlimbered and they have been tolling, even for those of us in Canada, who thought we were safe, safe, safe.

There has been a scientific survey conducted and, based on a random sample, purports to prove conclusively that what has happened in Israel does not cause anti-Semitism, that Israel can be totally ruled out as a causa causans of anti-Semitism anywhere in the Western World. On the other hand, as the top civilian police official in Metropolitan Toronto, I have in my hand, reports from police officers in the field that advises me that there is a direct co-relation between the level of anti-Jewish hysteria in the media and the number of incidents that are triggered against persons and property that are brought to their attention after such news items are sensationally billboarded in the media.

1982 saw a very sharp increase of such ingredients, the numbers for 1983 are not all in yet, but they have moderated.

All of this is really nothing compared to the casualties that poor little Israel has suffered in dead and wounded. How do



you moderate that? And how does it help when you watch the country torn apart by recriminations and counter recriminations? Criticism and advice is the greatest commodity Israel has for export today. If they could put a tax on it together with what we send them, they could put an end to their inflation overnight.

The prognosis for the coming year can only be positive. The victory in Lebanon and it was a victory — was nevertheless a Pyrrhic victory. The Bekaa quagmire can hardly be characterized as anything else. The cost was enormous and continues to be paid. Yet the disarray, upheval, pandemonium, total confusion and convulsions of the PLO can only have come as a result of this past year's events. This disarray and disorder is greatly beneficial to Israel and is certainly an object lesson to the pundits and critics, but, for our people, there never was an easy way.

In spite of everything, if we all pull together, everywhere, we can make it a great year. In the words of the 23rd Psalm, I truly believe that "yea" though we walk through the (Bekaa) Valley of the shadow of death, we need fear no evil for God is with us."




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## CAPE BRETON NEWS

## NATURAL BEAUTY AND THE TORAH

For our holidays this year, we purchased a hardtop trailer and set out to explore the west coast of Newfoundland. Much to the surprise, or more correctly amazement, of many people that we know, we travelled across the Island, stopping at several Provincial Parks along the way, eventually arriving at Gras Morne National Park, the place from which this article is being written.

Travelling across this Island and camping here with my family has verified two of my beliefs of which I will write. The first one is that not only is it possible, but practical as well, to strictly observe the laws of Kashrut while on a camping trip. While we, of course, had to bring our own meat along - an ice chest coming in very handy - and could of course not frequent the local restaurants, it was quite possible to purchase all of the provisions that we required - especially since we tried to be somewhat flexible. Camping, we have found, is not insurmountable for the kosher or even Shomer Shabbos camper.

The second point, and the one which is a little more pertinent as we approach the High Holidays, is that of the origin of the natural world. While scientists, in the main, and all those taken in by their propaganda, accept the notion that the world was formed by a series of accidents and random selection, after viewing some of the sights available at Gros Morne, my belief that the world must have had a Creator, has been verified - again. Artists spend their entire lives attempting to create a beautiful picture or sculpture. Yet, the best efforts of the most creative artist are dwarfed when compared to a view of Berry Head Pond at dusk, or a view of the fjords from Western Brook Pond. And yet, while one would have much difficulty attempting to find an intelligent person who will believe that a painting such as the Mona Lisa was created by random selection, there are ostensibly intelligent people who will say that the beauty and magnificence of the fjords on Berry Head Pond were formed by accident.

One of the prayers that we recite on Rosh Hashanah is the Tashlich Prayer. It is a prayer for which an origin cannot be

found in either the Bible or Talmud, but is nevertheless found in High Holiday liturgy of all communities of Jews - Sephardic, Ashkenazi, Misnagid and Hassidic, It is a prayer traditionally recited near a body of flowing water and one reason advanced for the inclusion of this prayer is that it recalls an ancient custom of the enthroning of kings near bodies of water. Since it is on Rosh Hashanah that we emphasize God's role as Creator and ruler of the universe, it is most appropriate that this prayer be recited during this period, since we, too, enthrone God at this time, as it were.

While G-d's majesty and dominion over the entire world is a basic belief of Judaism for which no additional proof should be required, my visit to Gros Morne National Park this summer has only served to verify and enhance this belief. Viewing the beauty and magnificence of the natural wonders of the park and surrounding areas, it seems impossible to me that any person could come to any other conclusion, except that there must be a designer and creator - i.e. G-d. This proof of the existence of G-d is, at least for me and my family, as clear and true now as it was when it was advanced by Maimonidies in the Moreh Hevuchim some eight hundred years ago.

My wife, my daughter and myself would like to wish all Jews in Atlantic Canada a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year.

Beginning at Magdiel, a Youth Aliyah Village, they continued on to Hadassim, then on to Nahalal, which was established fifty-five years ago as a girls' agricultural school. It is now co-educational and among its most famous graduates is the late general, Moshe Dayan, Z.L.

Visiting Asafe Harofe Hospital provided Reva and Sam a first handed opportunity to see the hospital's modern and sophisticated equipment, which in part has been provided by Hadassah—Wizo. The third largest hospital of its kind in Israel, it serves both Jew and Arab alike.

Their first Sabbath in Israel was celebrated at Wizo House where an attractive young blond girl, Avivah Marks, captured hearts and souls with her personal presentation of "Coming to our Homeland Through the Ages".

An exciting Saturday evening was spent at the home of Mordechai and Rachel Limon. Rachel is head of World Wizo; her husband, Mordechai, is a retired Admiral of the Israeli navy. Mordechai Limon helped thousands of illegal immigrants to enter Israel.

South to Yevul, a new settlement which replaces Yamit. This visit is remembered for the joy expressed by young girls receiving a gift of a piano. Thirty families are pioneering this new settlement.

Following the visit to the Neri Bloomfield Hafa College, which is marking its 10th anniversary, the tour went on to the Youth Aliyah Residential School, Afim Acco. There, 400 children receive special general studies and vocational training. The programs are structured for slow learners or for those who may have other learning disabilities.

In the hills of the Galilee, while visiting Zurit (Rock), a newly established Mitspe (lookout), the travellers attended the dedication of a family club. Seventeen couples and their children are dedicated to redeem and settle this project which is of great strategic and security value.

Jerusalem, the capital of Israel, cradle of three great religions, evoked profound feelings. When approaching Mount Zion, they could almost hear the echoes of the great prophets preaching their prophesies, many of which have been fulfilled in our time.

Memorial services were attended at the Military Cemetery honouring Israel's fallen soldiers, with Kaddush recited by a member of the tour, Mr. David Peters. In attending special memorial services at Yad Vashem, hearts beating with grief, spellbound at the sight of the living memorial to the 6 million who perished during the Holocaust. "Never again will we allow such a tragedy to happen to our people" (Menachem Begin).

Part of the itinerary included a welcome by Eliyahu Ben Eliassar, Chairman of Foreign Affairs Committee and first ambassador to Egypt during a tour of the Knesset; a luncheon hosted by Hebrew University president Abraham Harmon on the Mount Scopus campus.

As guests of the then president Itzchak, Navon and his wife, Ophira, at a reception for the Canadian Hadassah-Wizo group, many words of praise were heard and the hope that the organization will continue to work on behalf of Aliyah.

On a more personal note, Sam and Reva left early on Friday morning to visit Reva's late parents Z.L. at the cemetery on the Mount of Olives. With the aid of a few members of the Chevrai-Kadisha, their graves were found and prayers and the reciting of the Kaddush took place. An emotional experience for Reva, it was also very heart-warming. Finding it hard to say farewell, this first visit to her parents' graves was a highlight of her visit. Wonderful memories flashed across her mind. Her parents had come to Palestine while children—their parents were Rabbis who had come to study and teach Torah. Working hard to help build and redeem the land, they had raised their children in Jewish tradition and love for Zion. Known as Zadikim, righteous people, their home was open to everyone, and the are remembered in the Israeli Encyclopedia as being among the early pioneers who came to Palestine.

Friday evening, the Sabbath, was welcomed at the Western Wall, where messages and requests were placed in the crevices of the Holy Wall with the hope that all will be fulfilled.

Saturday evening a gala farewell banquet was bringing to a close a marvellous trip. Mayor Teddy Kollek, of Jerusalem, was the special guest. Special programs by members of the group, and the cutting of the 65th anniversary cake, were all part of the exciting evening.

One last event, a cocktail party hosted on Sunday by Bank Hapoalim was made even more memorable as special guests were the then newly appointed Canadian Ambassador to Israel, Vern Turner and his wife.

Leaving Israel is always hard, but the mission participants were all intoxicated not with wine - but with the nachus (happiness) they had all derived from seeing with their own eyes, the achievements, accomplishments and progress during the last 35 years: years when Israel was forced to fight four wars, and in 1982, to launch "Operation Peace for Galilee" to stop once and for all the brutal attacks and killings of innocent Jewish settlers. Accomplishing this, Israel paid the supreme price with the lives of dear sons.

Israel carries a heavy burden, facing serious problems in her economy. Israel, which has taken in the highest number of refugees per capita in the world, experiencing the highest rate of inflation in the world, is forced to spend a huge slice of her income on security. Israel is a modern day miracle.

Along with the ninety-seven participants, Reva and Sam expressed how fortunate they were to be able to celebrate the 65th anniversary of Canadian Hadassah-Wizo in Israel and to be able to actually see the fruits of their efforts. For forty years, Reva Lipton had the great honour to serve the Queen Esther Chapter of Hadassah-Wizo in Sydney, N.S. Forty consecutive years helping Israel and her people. Forty happy years which she dearly treasures.

As they boarded the plane to return home, emotions ran high and all expressed the hope of returning shortly.

#### INTERNATIONAL HEARING ON ANTI-SEMITISM

This hearing which was held in Oslo in June 1983 was under the Chairmanship of the well-known writer, Eli Wiesel.

An age-old monster is again haunting the world. A monster many of us wanted to believe lied dead and buried under the ruins of the Second World War. Its name is antisemitism.

Meeting in Oslo in June 1983, at the Nansen Committee's hearing on antisemitism, we appeal to all people of goodwill and conscience to take heed of this warning, realizing the tragic price the Jews, and thereby all mankind, paid less than a generation ago when similar warnings against antisemitism were ignored and failed to move the world.

We find that, 38 years after the fall of the regime of Hitler, antisemitism expresses itself again, both in its old disguise and in new forms. Bombs are thrown at Jewish schools and old-age homes, at buses carrying Jewish school children on vacation and at synagogues. Jews as individuals are being threatened with their lives. Antisemitic writers and teachers are conducting campaigns to persuade a world, eager to forget and unable to cope with its recent past, that the mass murder of six million European Jews during the Second World War only is a product of Jewish propaganda - that it never happened.

The traditional, vulgar stereotypes of

antisemitism are now being applied to the Jewish state, which arose from the holocaust to provide a haven for survivors of antisemitism.

As were Jews in the past, Israel is today threatened by isolation in the international community of nations; it is being judged by standards not applied to any other nation.

In the past, antisemitism in its most virulent form strove to deprive the Jews of the very right to exist. To use a world from the old vocabulary, antisemitism tried to make the world Judenfrei (free of Jews). Today's antisemitism frequently denies Jews the right to a secure, national existence in their homeland, thereby following the traditional pattern, trying to establish a situation where the world again becomes Jedenstaatrein (free of a Jewish state).

Nobody should be denied the right fairly to criticize policies or actions committed by the government of any country, including the government of Israel. But when criticism turns into denial of the right of the Jewish state to exist on line with other independent nations; and when Jews are deprived of their right with the age-old monster of antisemitism conveniently camouflaged in a new disguise of an antizionism that denies the Jews fundamental freedoms and rights which other individuals and nations take for granted - then this equals discrimination against Jews as a group.

We find, furthermore, evidence that the contemporary hatred of Jews takes the form of a state-controlled antisemitism, as experienced in totalitarian countries.

We feel convinced that antisemitism in all its forms, direct or disguised, is dangerous not only to the Jews, but to all mankind which professes the values and ideas of humanism, democracy and freedom. Antisemitism in the past always threatened the Jews first, but it did not stop there. Its evil consequences spread to society in general, destroying it in the process. Antisemitism threatens you and us no less than the Jews in our midst. It is a Gentile problem of survival no less than a problem for the Jews.

We realize the fact and welcome the growth of a genuine revulsion against this plague. We demand that institutions of broad educational programmes, and textbooks for the young, fight prejudice against any group, in particular against Jews. We therefore call upon all free women and men everywhere to fight the rising new antisemitism and thereby help in protecting us all, non-Jews and Jews, from that virulent disease.

## NO CARROTS NO STICKS

Mankind is motivated by the hope of reward or the fear of punishment.

The vast majority of successful people who were born poor and insecure, had a natural desire to make sure that they would avoid the insecurity of poverty. On the other hand, many who were born into the lap of luxury and security, lack the ambition to succeed. It appears that without the carrot-and-the-stick motivation people do not progress. The old adage, necessity is the mother of invention, proves true.

What has this to do with the situation in Israel? From my point of view it has everything to do with the situation in Israel. Israel has, in order to physically survive, developed the most astounding military defensive force because of the fear of being conquered and destroyed by the surrounding Arab nations. The result has been that Israel has successfully defeated every attempt at its destruction.

Let us examine the economy of Israel. Normally, the military prowess of any country is based on its economic strength. Military budgets are derived from revenues received from the taxation of the country's citizens. Fortunately Israel does not rely solely upon its own resources for a very substantial part of its own economy or its defence. This is not to say that outside help has been the major element at all in both its economic growth or its bravery in war. Ultimately the human element within a country is really the deciding factor. The efficiency and ambition of its citizens in peaceful occupation and the bravery and dedication of its armed forces, cannot be compared to outside help. For example, the few billion dollars, a year American partially loans and partially gives to Israel is a minute fraction of about one percent of the \$150. billion it would cost America to replace the over one half million Israeli soldiers, with battle experience, the country can put in the field to prevent Moscow from controlling all the oil of the Persian Gulf.

It is very obvious that the principle of the carrot-and-the-stick certainly applies in reference to the defence and security of Israel. But does it also apply to the economy of Israel? It has been estimated that the productivity of the average worker is a fraction of the worker in almost every other free and industralized country in the world. It has been admitted that Israel's productivity was about fifty percent of the average American worker and as low as one-quarter of the average Swiss worker in 1978.

In 1975 the then Minister of Finance stated that for every one percent increase in productivity, there would be an increase of one hundred million dollars in the gross national product. Properly motivated, Israel could increase its productivity and G.N.P. by many billions and become economically independent. You can't have chicken soup without chickens, and you can't have more by producing less.

Is it because there is a lack of the carrotand-stick-principle for too many workers in Israel, that the productivity of the country is so low? Recently the new regime in Communist China has revised its thinking of giving unconditional job security for all workers and has replaced it with a system which provides motivation for greater productivity. It is even allowing private enterprise and profit motivation in business. This is a very revolutionary concept compared to the former philosophy, that stated everyone is entitled to work regardless of how much he produces and to equality of access to material rewards. From now on, each person in China will be rewarded by a standard of living dependent upon their productivity. Workers could even be dismissed from their job if they do not do their best. Evidently they believe in the slogan "Take pride in your work, the whole world is competing for your job!"

In Communist Russia, Mr. Andropov as soon as he succeeded Mr. Brezhev, repeatedly emphasized the importance of **Productivity!** Many economists feel that productivity or more correctly, increased productivity, is at the root of a country's prosperity. Or to say it another way, lack of productivity is the root of the world's economic problems. That is to say if productivity increases, the unit cost

of what is produced goes down and this makes it possible to compete with imports, increase exports, thus reducing the trade deficit. Economic forces are as universal as the law of gravity. Human nature everywhere is motivated by the hope of reward and fear of punishment. By the stick or the carrot!

Does the productivity apply to the law of supply and demand? As the supply of goods increases from increased productivity, it is quite probable that the price of goods (providing the government does not print too much money) would go down; in other words, increased productivity has a direct influence upon inflation. And is not inflation the cause of high interest rates? In order to offset the reduced purchasing power of his money, upon repayment he must increase interest rates to bring both into balance.

It will reduce balance of payment deficits. It will stabilize the value of the currency, that is to say, increasing productivity is getting at the root of economic problems and not merely treating the symptoms.

In reference to Israel's economy, which in the final analysis will strengthen Israel's political independence, its military strength and its human resources, the productivity of the country must be increased or it will forever be dependent upon foreign influence.

How can this be done? The worker in Israel needs both the carrot and the stick. The carrot could be a government law offering a discount in income tax to any employer that installs a profit-sharing plan or increased profits, or a cost-reduction sharing plan on a voluntary basis, providing the plan is generous enough to provide a real incentive for increased wages and productivity and the plan is approved by the government.

The stick should be the right of any employer to dismiss any worker who does not do his best at the job and who is not as productive as he could be, who does not help his employer with ideas to make the enterprise more efficient and more profitable.

Even in the case of government employees, they should also be given a share of the reduced costs of operations. Work stoppages would decrease. Over staffing would gradually be eliminated. Even the ministers of the cabinet should get a share of the reduced costs of their department. Ultimately more of the population will be employed in the tax-paying sector and fewer would be living on tax revenue.

### **CONGRESS REORGANIZES Canadian Jewish Congress**

National Officers recently announced that a new and more efficient organizational structure is being implemented. Under the new structure, the positions of National Executive Director and Quebec Region Executive Director are to be combined. The new Executive Director will report directly to the National Officers who are, in turn, responsible to the CJC National Executive and CJC National Council.

The Executive Director is supported by an executive secretary and executive assistant and is seconded by the regional directors, project directors, program directors, director of communications, and controller, all of whom report back to the Executive Director. Accordingly, the executive directorship is an administrative position, with clearly established line responsibilities.

The Executive Director of CJC is responsible for the administration and overall performance of the national body as well as CJC operations in the Quebec

Of considerable note is also the fact that the position of CJC Executive Vice-President is redefined: His portfolio will be given significant prominence within the organization. While the Executive Vice-President will report directly to the CIC National Officers, he will relate on a functional basis to the Executive Director with whom he will work in close consultation and cooperation.

Given the Executive Vice-President's proven expertise in the field of government relations, his sphere of activity will primarily encompass public and federal government affairs. He may also be asked to intervene at the provincial level should he be requested to make representations on specific political matters of interest to the welfare of the Jewish community.

The Executive Vice-President will also provide advice and counsel to all program directors and committee chairpersons in CJC's area of activity. The Executive Vice-President, more specifically, will concentrate on matters dealing with Soviet Jewry, oppressed Jewry, community relations, and international affairs.

The President, Chairman of the Executive, Executive Director, and Executive Vice-President will form an informal policy cabinet that will regularly advise the National Officers on all major policy decisions.

The new structural changes within Canadian Jewish Congress are designed to streamline the organization's operation and provide for enhanced accountability to CJC's constituencies so as to obtain optimum performance and greater impact on regional, national, and international areas under CJC's jurisdiction.

#### CALL TO GRANT RECOGNITION TO ISRAEL'S MAGEN DAVID **ADOM SOCIETY**

Christian leaders of Catholic and Protestant denominations from various parts of the world have issued an urgent call to the International Committee of the Red Cross to grant immediate recognition to Israel's Magen David Adom Society, which is the equivelant to Red Cross groups in western countries. The announcement issued by Rabbi Rubin R. Dobin, National Chairman of Operation Recognition, thanked the following Church groups for adding their voice of protest against the rank bigotry and discrimination shown by the Geneva based Red Cross in keeping the Israeli volunteer humanitarian organization out of the Red Cross world family: The Presiding Bishops of the World Lutheran Federation, The Swiss Council of Bishops, The Quakers Friends Service Committee, The Churches of Christ African Council, The United States Council of Catholic Bishops, The National Council of Churches, and many others.

Rabbi Dobin explained that Israel fulfills nine of the ten criteria for admission more than adequately. The tenth requirement is one that all fair minded people agree Israel should not be expected to accept, i.e. establishing as its emblem either the Chrisitan Red Cross or the Moslem Red Crescent. Israel feels that it should be allowed to use its own emblem, whichis the Magen David Adom, The Red Shield of David.

Canadian Friends of the Hebrew University — If you have attended any of the courses and programs offered by the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, or if

you knew someone who did, keep reading.

Canadian Friends of the Hebrew University has just announced the establishment of an alumni association, to bring together the hundreds of Canadians, many from the Maritimes, who have studied over the years at Hebrew U. This year alone there are 200 Canadians there, ready to swell the alumni ranks next year. A first mailing to prospective members will go out in September.

The new venture is initially being coordinated by Canadian Friends' national headquarters in Toronto. Once membership applications begin coming in, work will start on the association's first big project, National Hebrew University Day, a reunion early in 1984 to be held simultaneously by alumni groups in the Mariti-

mes and across the country.

Avvie Druker, president of the Cape Breton chapter of Canadian Friends, said in a recent interview that he thinks the alumni association is "an interesting idea. It's always good to involve the youth with the university and it's especially important if it involves those who have firsthand knowledge and who have benefitted from Hebrew U., who also might feel a responsibility to help it."

Those who join will begin to receive Friends' mailings and invitations to lectures in their cities by Hebrew University

professors and personnel.

rights continue to voice their views, both publicly and directly, to representatives of the Soviet Government. In this respect, I would encourage you to write to Dr. Yakovlev, the Soviet Ambassador in Ottawa.

For our part, I can assure you that we will continue to seek opportunities to make effective representations in the hope that our repeated efforts will lead to the release of persecuted individuals and an eventual improvement in Soviet attitudes and actions with respect to both emigration and human rights in general.

In your letter you expressed an interst in the results of the Parliamentary Mis-

sion which went to the Soviet Union last autumn. This was in fact a private visit under taken by three Members of Parliment, the Honourable Flora MacDonald, David Smith and Ian Deans. I would suggest you contact them directly for an account of their visit.

## SHARE THE JOYS OF HOMEMAKING

#### Rosh Hashanah

We seldom give much though to the holiday table. Not that we don't look forward to eating honey cake and the other sweets of Rosh Hashanah, but we hardly associate this humble fare with the more lofty aspect of the High Holidays: prayer, repentance, forgiveness, the Synagogue, the blowing of the shofar. Yet in the foods we eat, even in the very way we set our tables, we find the meaning of the holiest season of the Jewish year and we renew our ancient ties to the land of Israel.

Consider the eve of Rosh Hashanah table! The white tablecloth. Why a white tablecloth? Because white is associated with purity and simplicity. It is also associated with freshness, newness, and humility, a reminder of life and death, all very important aspects of the Days of Judgement and Atonement. Even the bouquet of white flowers - composites, the daisy shape, for simplicity - expresses the important themes of the holy season. In the synagogue these ideas are embodied in the white Torah covering, the white yarmulke, the white kittel, and the white curtains covering the ark.

White is also the color of the squill, a plant which blossoms all over Israel at the same time beginning in mid-August when the olives begin to ripen. This is when, in ancient times, single girls dressed in white and danced in the olive groves and single men looked for wives among them. The agricultural feast associated with this season was called Tu B'Av (or Olive Day). It was a stricly agricultural holiday which disappeared in the Diaspora once the ties to the land of Israel were broken. As Nogah Hareuveni points out in his wonderful book, Nature is Our Biblical Heritage, only those holidays which had a spiritual as well as an agricultural component survived the Exile.

Girls dressed in white danced in the olive groves not only on TuB'Av, but, what seemed most shocking to us now, on Yom Kippur as well. Then, this holiday was associated with betrothals and rejoicing. The element of God's forgiveness for the people's initial rejection of the 10 Commandments assured the holiday's survival in the Diaspora when this theme was elaborated and became the central feature of Yom Kippur. Rosh Hashanah, which does not appear to be mentioned until the Second Century in the Mishnah, is elevated, too, from its earlier designation as an agricultural occasion: the first of Tishrei was a new year for planting. Rosh Hashanah, then, shares in the symbols of Yom Kippur because both holidays became a spiritual entity, the one dependent on the other. A whole nation, now without a land (before the establishement of modern Israel),

but still a whole people, wherever they lived shared in the joy of a new year of renewal and

We do not know if the use of white as a symbol for the holiday can be traced to the blossoming of the white squill or the wearing of white in the olive groves, but we do know that the wearing of white on the High Holidays goes back to the Yerushalmi talmud (via Leo Rosten's Joys of Yiddish): "... Jews should not appear depressed and in somber clothes, as suppliants before a human judge, but joyous, dressed in festive white, betokening a cheerful and confident spirit."

The candles, wine ad hallah. These are the essential features of every major holiday table, including, of course, the Sabbath table. Why? Again the answer can be traced to the land of Israel before the destruction of the Temple when offerings of grain, oil, and wine, fruits of the people's labors, signified their faith that one Creator, and only one, was responsible for bringing the opposing forces of nature into balance and allowing the crops to prosper.

After the destruction of the Temple when offerings could no longer be brought to a central place of worship and when the scattered remnants of the tribes of Israel no longer tilled their land, each individual dwelling became a temple and the family table, the alter. On this was laid, on festive occasions, the hallah for grain, the glasses of wine as a libation, and the candles as a substitute for olive oil. Thus, the land of Israel is symbolically present on the Jewish table every Sabbath and on every major holiday. In this way, comments Nogah Hareuveni, "... the land of Israel has been preserved as an integral part of the structure of Judaism from generation to generation throughout the wanderings of the Jewish people."

Sephardic tradition puts more emphasis on the Rosh Hashanah meal as a Seder like the Passover meal with symbolic foods and other special features. Edda Servi Machlin, in The Classic Cuisine of the Italian Jews, describes the table centerpiece used by her family on Rosh Hashanah in the Italian Village of Pitigliano: " . . . about a week in advance . . . the bottom of two fancy fruit dishes were loosely covered - one with grains of wheat, the other with corn kernels. Water was added to cover and then the dishes were left on top of the mantel-piece until the night of the Seder...by the night of the Seder the wheat would be three to four inches and the corn two to three inches high... During the ten days of the High Holy Days that culminate with Yom Kippur, the plants had grown approximately fifteen and ten inches tall and had to be tied

with ribbons so they would not bend or fall . . . After Yom Kippur we would dispose of the plants, generally giving them to the neighbors who raised a few chickens . . . '

Though she does not mention it, this custom closely resembles kapparot, the ancient custom of purging oneself of wrong doings by passing them to another living thing. It was not uncommon for parents in Eastern Europe, observing kapparot on Rosh Hashanha, to braid baskets for their children 15 days before Rosh Hashanah and fill them with soil sowed with wheat, barley, beans, and peas. "Each child took a basket on the eve of Rosh Hashanah, swung it over his head seven times, and said, 'This is instead of me, this is my exchange'. After the ceremony, the children threw the baskets into a stream." (Rosh Hashanah & Yom Kippur, Malka Drucker).

The Food. Jewish traditions vary according to country and culture and the Sephardic holiday table might differ from the Ashkenazi in the type of foods eaten at the meal or used to symbolize the essence of the holiday but both cultures emphasize the theme of hoped for sweetness in the year to come. Traditionally, both Sephardic and Ashkenazi Rosh Hashanah eve meals begin with apple pieces dipped in honey followed by the words, "May it be Your will, God and God of our fathers and mothers. to renew on us a good and sweet year." Good is symbolized by the apple, sweetness by the honey. In the context of Rosh Hashanah a good year is one in which a person has performed good deeds. According to custom nothing bitter or sour is served and sweet dishes appear in every course of the meal. Common to both cultures, as a final sweet, is teiglach, pieces of dough cooked in honey.

Hallah is both a symbol of the ancient grain offering and a fine combination to the holiday meal. On this special occasion, following the theme of sweetness in the year to come, it is often sweetened with extra sugar and raisins are added to the dough - white raisins, of course. Unlike the sabbath hallah, the Rosh Hashanah bread is shaped like a crown or pyramid to represent the head of the year. It may also be ladder-shaped to emphasize the hope that one's prayers are travelling heavenward. The same idea is embodied in the pre-Yom Kippur fast meal when the hallah may be shaped like wings to help one's prayers fly to heaven.

Recipes

This hallah recipe comes from Etta David of Sydney who, like many good traditional Jewish cooks is the custodian of traditions which span the centuries and represent some of the many strands of Diasporan life. Etta and her sister Rebecca (Mrs. Sam Jacobson) of Halifax have both contributed to my recent research on the traditional Jewish dish, rosl, which will be discussed in a later column.

Etta says this hallah is "braided for Sabbath" in a round pyramid shape for Rosh Hashanah, and five times normal size for Purim when it is called Keylitch. "I have added raisins and extra sugar to the original recipe. However you spell it, the breads the same.

#### Challa

Sabbath & Festival Bread Cooking time 1 hour.

To make two loaves you will need:

½ cup sugar

l ounce dry yeast dissolved in ½ cup warm water

2 cups warm water

21/4 lbs. flour sifted, or more as needed

3 teaspoons salt

3 eggs lightly beaten

4 tablespoons oil

1/2 cup white raisins

#### To Glaze:

1 egg yolk beaten lightly with

2 tablespoons water

Poppy or sesame seed for sprinkling.

Mix as usual for bread. Before baking brush with egg yolk diluted with water, sprinkle with seeds, and bake in a moderate oven until golden.



To shape a crown:

Take a large piece of dough. Roll out in a long thick strip (about 18" long -2"-3" wide). One end should be slightly thicker than the other. Take the thicker end, place it in the

middle of a round pan, and wind the rest of the strip around it 2 - 3 times.

Use a cookie sheet if you do not have a round pan.

Another custodian of Jewish traditions embodies in the Diasporan cooking is my aunt Rhoda Lang of Silver Spring, Maryland. She, too serves the crown hallah, sweet and round, at Rosh Hashanah for a continuously happy new year. Many of her fine old recipes come from my grandmother (see Grandma's Honey Cake, Jan./Feb., 1983, Shalom). She not only makes Grandma's original honey cake, she makes Grandma's teiglah, one of the most unusual teiglachs I have ever seen round balls coated with honey and rolled in coconut. Each one has a raisin or two as a surprise in the middle of the dough. From my grandmothers 'a little of this and a little of that' here is Grandma's teiglach, reconstructed by my Aunt Rhoda:

#### Grandma's Teiglach

4 eggs 1/4 cup oil

1 teaspoon baking powder 2 cups flour or more

1 tablespoon sugar

#### Syrup

1-2 lb. jar honey (about 1½ cup)

2 cups sugar

Mix ingredients for dough well. Add more flour if necessary to make a dough you can handle. Make long strips of dough. Add a raisin or two to the end of the strip of dough and wind into small balls. Drop balls into boiling syrup and boil about 40 minutes. When slightly cool, roll the drained balls in coconut.

When I make these, I usually make 24 balls. It depends on the size you want them. As I recall, Grandma's teiglach were about the size of an unshelled walnut.

The Rosh Hashanah holiday table, like the table at other important Jewish occasions, is laden the history of a people from the time when girls dressed in white in the olive groves of ancient Israel to the time when after centuries of wandering, the ancient land again brings forth new fruit on the soil of modern Israel.

By the time you read this column the High Holidays will have come and gone. I hope, nevertheless, that you find something of interest here and that you will try these recipes. Sweetness is always in season. Please remember that your comments and suggestions are always appreciated. I am now collecting ideas for a children's holiday crafts column. 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## FOR ALIYAH CANDIDATES

Israel offers new immigrants (Olim) excellent job opportunities, particularly in its high technology professions. However, the problem for potential Olim is pinpointing where these jobs exist amid ever-shifting labor market conditions.

The Aliyah Department is attempting to make this search easier by organizing special "fact-finding" trips for Aliyah candidates seeking high technology careers in Israel. Although the Department has been sponsoring pilot trips for same time, its current emphasis on high technology is based on recent labor market analysis showing a growing trend towards science based industries.

Such industries enjoy special status in Israel, and their access to large research and development grants ensures their continued expansion, according to Aryeh Chapman, Tour Va'Aleh's section for the Initiation of Aliyah Projects.

Among professions currently experiencing substantial growth include: electronics, agro-technology, computer graphics and software, medical, engineering, chemicals, energy and dentistry.

"Because Olim coming with science-based professions require little retraining they can begin work almost immediately which substantially eases their absorption," said Chapman. "And because Israel's high technology industries enjoys international recognition and respect, Olim are offered a standard of excellence comparable to their previous jobs," he explains.

According to Chapman, mission participants are recruited through advertisements in professional journals and newspapers abroad and from Aliyah office files containing such names of potential candidates.

The trips, which last two or three weeks, enable participants to discuss employment opportunities with prospective employers, Israeli colleagues, and experts in their particular fields. They also include visits to Absorption Centers, new housing areas and development towns.

Another advantage of high-technology trips, says Chapman is that "many of these participants are better suited to settle in Israel's development regions, which offer better employment possibilities.

We are also making a concerted effort to attract qualified dentists to Israel. More than 70% of the country's population suffers from inadequate dental care, Chapman points out, and the problem is especially acute outside Israel's major urban areas.

Aside from organizing tours, Chapman's office is working with other organizations which bring Jewish dentists to Israel on short-term volunteer programs, such as the group in Ashkelon where British dentists, under Project Renewal, volunteer their services for a month. Thereby, taking advantage of all possibilities of promoting Israel's needs among specific professional groups in Israel's development areas, where job and housing opportunities are greater. The scenic regions in Israel's Western Galilee are becoming key areas for high technology production. Several major science-based companies have opened up branches and numerous moshavim (cooperatives) currently support industries manufacturing products ranging from computer software to sophisticated medical equipment.

#### **DID YOU KNOW**

**FACTS ON "JEWISH" MEDICINE** 

Dr. Simon Baruch (1840-1921) was the first doctor in the world to diagnose appendicitus and to operate successfully on it. His removing the diseased appendix before it punctured was considered revolutionary. Amongst his numerous other contributions was his promotion of cleanliness in preventive medicine. His involvement in promoting washing and bathing

was instrumental in his opening of the first American public bath. He was called "the Apostle of Bathing". He was also notable as the father of Bernard Baruch, Presidential Advisor and Financier!

The founder of Pediatrics was **Dr. Abraham Jocabi** (1830 - 1919). By 1870, Pediatrics, especially the feeding of babies, was approached as a science, through his efforts and teachings.

**Dr. Jonas E. Salk** provided the world with the Salk vaccine for the prevention of Polio in 1955. Twenty years later, **Dr. Albert Sabin**, 1974 developed an oral Polio vaccine.

## CZF ISRAEL BRIEFS (JNI JERUSALEM)

#### RADIO WAVES DIAGNOSE TUMORS & DISEASE

Elscint Electronics is developing a device that uses radio waves to diagnose tumors and certain lung and liver diseases. A spokeswoman for the Friends of Rothchild Hospital revealed that a prototype is already being tested on animals and has produced positive results. Of the ten medical electronics firms still operating in the world, only three are in the red. Elscint, the second most profitable is also represented on the New York Stock Exchange.

#### IMPROVED CANCER DETECTION

A Hebrew University team of scientists has developed a new, simple, and highly sensitive method for the early detection of cancer, a university spokesman announced recently. The procedure, now undergoing clinical testing at Hadassah Hospital, is based on the presence of chemical "markers" in the urine of cancer victims. The test consist of electrical analysis by means of a new instrument, much less expensive than an earlier U.S. model, which was also able to conduct only a limited number of costly tests per day. Once the reliability of the method is proved, the scientists hope to conduct tests among the broadest population for the early detection of cancer and, if possible, to monitor the effectiveness of drug therapy to permit optimal treatment without excessive use of radiation and chemotherapy.

#### **NEW VERSION**

Many Russian Jews are reportedly reading the new version of the Encyclopedia Judaica, recently published in their native tongue and smuggled into the Soviet Union. The first two of the sixvolume edition were completed by the by the Society for Research of Jewish Communities and the Hebrew University, with contributions from U.S. and European Jewry. The project is to be completed in less than four years.

#### TORA CROWN RESTORED AND DEDICATED

Ra'anana, a recrafted replica of a tora crown was consecrated as a gift from Wuppertal, Germany, where the original crown was destroyed or stolen on Crystal Night in November 1938. Max Banker told the assembled congregation how, on Crystal Night, his late father had salvaged two tora scrolls from the ruins of Wuppertal's neighborhood synagogue and brought them with his family on Aliya to Palestine one year later.

### J.I.A.S. PROFESSIONAL STAFF CONFERENCE

The Annual Professional Staff Conference was held in Parry Sound, Ontario from June 5 to June 7, 1983. This conference, in large measure funded by the Ministry of Employment and Immigration, as well as the Secretary of State, Multiculturalism, had delegates from all sections of Canada represented.

An added feature of this conference, for the first time, was a group of representatives of newcomer Jews from the Soviet Union now residing in Canada, in communities situated from coast to coast. Workshops specially designed for them were arranged. These workshop topics included integration matters, both communal and Jewish, self-help groups and their importance, programming for such groups, fund-raising, membership, etc. Shirlee Fox, Executive Director of the Atlantic Jewish Council attended on behalf of the Atlantic Jewish Council.

#### **SEA OF GALILEE MARATHON** SET FOR DECEMBER

Tiberias, Israel: - A thousand runners from Israel and around the world are expected to participate this December in the 17th International Sea of Galilee Marathon. The race is open to all ama-

teur athletes in possession of medical certification of their fitness to compete in a marathon.

The marathon follows a route around the shore of this legendary lake starting from Kibbutz in En Gev on the lake's eastern shore. En Gev's main industry is fishing and was founded in 1937 by immigrants from Europe, one of whom, Teddy Kollek, was to become Mayor of Jerusalem.

Five hundred athletes from around the world participated in the 1982 marathon the winner of which was Rafi Saltzman of Israel. Sally Strauss of the United States won the women's competition.



## SONG WRITTEN FOR CAMP MACHAR '83



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## A MOMENT OF HEBREW

## רגע של עברית

The land of Israel was the birthplace of the Jewish people. There, our spiritual, religious and national identity was formed and Hebrew was transformed from a sacred language of prayer into an everyday spoken language.

Israel offers self-fulfillment for all Jews, and a place where one can live a full Jewish life - national, spiritual, religious and cultural - that cannot be realized anywhere else.

Making the decision to emigrate to Israel is never easy, and requires self-understanding and courage, but with a minor effort one can spend the High Holidays in Israel. Israel is a beautiful country and is undoubtedly the best place to be during the holidays - whether religious or secular, major or minor. There, one can really sense the meaning of a holiday in Jewish life.

The Hebew month of Elul is the period of preparation - emotionally and psychologically - for introspection, a review of the year and the repentance which takes place during the High Holidays. It is customary during this period to wish each other "Le shana tova" and send special Rosh Hashanah cards.

With the beginning of the Selichot-Penitential Prayers which are recited the Saturday night before Rosh Hashanah for a minimum of four days - the tenor of the High Holidays intensifies.

Rosh Hashanah is on the one hand, the "day of judgement" - a solemn time of reconciliation and the confrontation of the past year; on the other hand, this Yom Hazikaron, Yom Harat Olam, the birthday of the world - a joyous remembrance of the creation.

When we change around the first word of the Torah, we have the First of Tishri, "G-d began to create the heaven and the earth."

Beginning with Rosh Hashanah and continuing throughout the following ten days ending on Yom Kippur, the whole atmosphere changes, people greet and bless each other with a "shana tova tikatevu, le shana tovah u-metuka" — "May you be inscribed for a good sweet year." This period marks a concentrated form of introspection and reconciliation.


During these ten days, it is customary to ask forgiveness of people whom we have slighted or hurt during the year while the atonement of Yom Kippur is between man and G-d alone. Yom Kippur itself is marked by physical abstinence because, by forgetting the body needs, man can concentrate on the spiritual, more intensely and gloriously.

The greeting used during this day is "Gemar Hatimah Tovah" May you be finally sealed for good" meaning in the Book of Life. The final element is the loud, long, piercing shofar blast which comes at the end of Neilah, closing service, which marks the final sealing of the heavenly gates.

Yom Kippur is the culmination of the entire High Holiday period. After this,

hopefully, the old year is ended and the new one begins with the closing prayer: "Be shanah Ha vah be Yerushalaim," Next year in Jerusalem". And there is nothing more exciting than being present at this ceremony at the Kotel wailing wall and participating that same evening in the construction of the Sukkah as a reaffirmation of the continuity of the year and the people.

I wish you all "Shana Tova U-metukah" and a sincere" be shanah ha vah be Yerushalaim Ha Bnuyah".


